Had he stayed in Kingston he would have received a position as camp chaplain at Barriefield during the summer months.

THE STATEMENTS OF CHURCH WORK OF YEAR.

A New Departure at Brock Street Methodist Congregation's Annual Meeting Held on Wednesday Night.

There was a new departure in the annual congregational meeting of Brock Street Methodist Church on Wednesday night, when instead of the time-honored practice of calling up the various officers of church societies to read their several balance sheets and give information about their year's activities, the different statements were boiled down to a concise form, written on lantern slides, and thrown on the screen for all to see. The experiment was a decided success and the meeting proved unusually interesting, more especially as the reports were all of the bright, hopeful sort, and told a story of progress and prosperity.

The meeting was opened with a brief devotional service led by the pastor, and two much appreciated solos were sung by Miss VanLoven, of Watertown, N.Y. The representatives of the congregation to the official board were then elected, the following being chosen: R. W. Allen, T. F. Auld, W. Drury, John E. Burdett, Enoch Godwin, Alfred Kinch and John Crawford.

The Sunday school, of which Dr. C. C. Nash is superintendent, reported 287 on the roll, besides 61 in the Home Department and 48 little ones on the cradle roll. The annual income, \$225, is provided by the offerings, and after spending \$134 on lesson helps and papers, \$30 on Sunday school extension work, \$37 on sundry expenses, the school has a balance of \$24 on hand. In addition to this, \$36 has been given to missions by the scholars. The Epworth League, with 36 active members, has held its weekly meetings regularly, doing a lot of Red Cross work, studying missions, citizenship, and the Bible, and out of an income of \$59 has contributed \$30 to various benevolences, paid its running expenses, and preserved a balance of \$7 on the right side. Miss Vera VanLoven is president, and Miss Margaret Lemmon secretary of the League.

The Woman's Missionary Auxiliary is a new organization in the church, having been organized in November last, with a membership of 26, holding a monthly meeting, and raising in the six months \$44 for missions. Mrs. George S. Clendinning is president. Mr. Douglas Pound was recently appointed delegate to the branch convention to be held in Ottawa at the end of the month. Much interest was shown in the report of the Ladies' Aid Society, which is one of the strongest working agencies in the congregation. The membership is 46, the income \$454, and it took two slides to contain the story of the work of the ladies in providing for the comfort of the church and parsonage. The president is Mrs. George Pound, and the secretary Mrs. W. J. Lee.

The report of the Boy's Circle of young ladies, of which Miss Edith Harten is president, gave a record of successful work. The income was \$101.70, \$25 of which was spent for Sunday school equipment, and the young ladies have maintained their share of the church work with fine enthusiasm.

It was shown that there are 200 families and 341 communicants, and that 46 men had enlisted for the war. The benevolence of the church were supported as follows: Mission, \$281; superannuation fund, \$101; social services and evangelism, \$40; educational fund, \$35; other connexional funds, \$58, most of these figures showing a substantial increase over last year. W. J. Lee, treasurer of the church, presented a full statement of the finances of the year, showing all bills met and a good balance in hand.

A set of bible and missionary pictures were then shown, including portraits of the pastor and some of the Sunday school officers, after which the ladies served refreshments.

The remains were conveyed to Cataract cemetery on a gun carriage followed by a firing party and a large number of the members of the Veterans' Association.

The reeve and county clerk of Lennox and Addington have expressed their appreciation of the action of the Kingston Veterans' Association in undertaking the burial of the deceased veteran, relieving that municipality of the expense.

Capt. the Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald, chaplain of the Veterans' Association, was unable to officiate as he had to attend the funeral of one of his parishioners at the same hour.
