"FAMILY TREE" OF THAT \$1,000,000 FUSE CON TRACT COMMISSION.

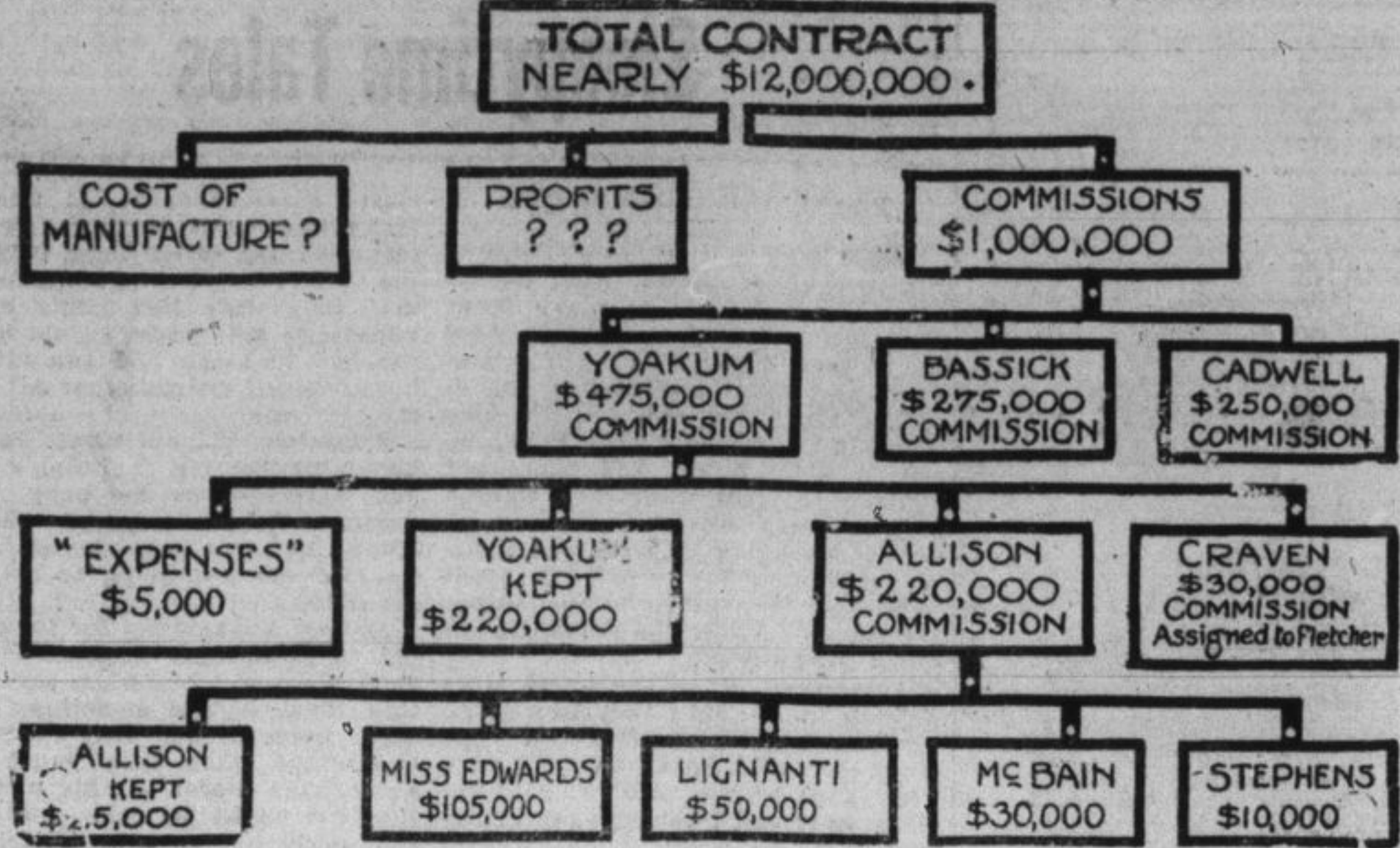


Diagram shows the disposition made of the million dollar commission of the fuse contracts as brought out in the Ottawa Shell Committee investigation.

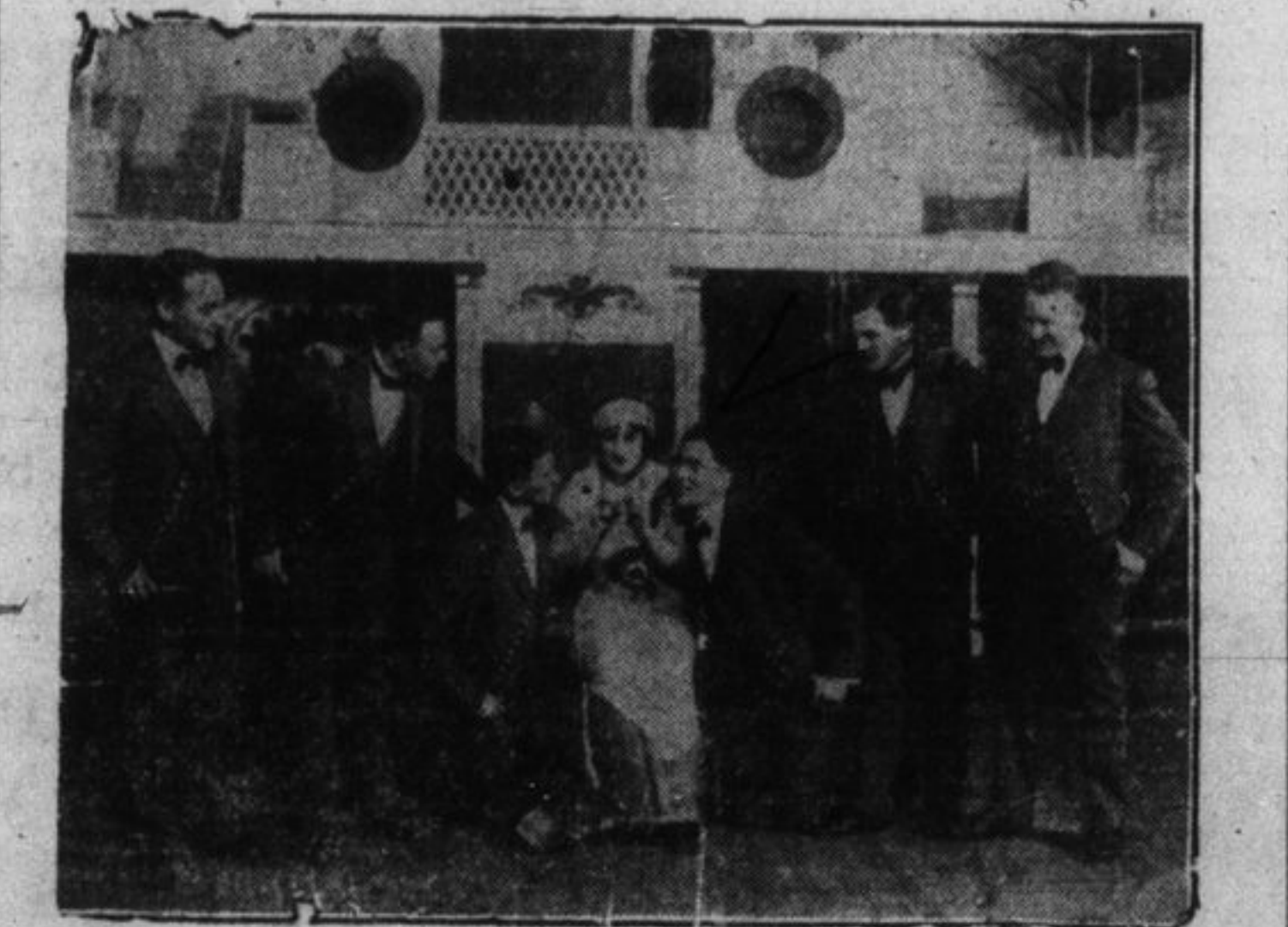
