### MANY ARE HOMELESS OWING TO FLOODS.

At New Boston, Illinois—Former Wolfe Islander Writes to Whig.

The Whig has received a letter from a former resident of Wolfe Island, in the person of David W. McVeigh, who is now located at New Boston, Ill. Mr. McVeigh writes to renew his subscription to the Whig and in doing says:

"I would not miss the Whig, for I like it better than any of the periodicals I take in connection with my work on the frontier. I came here on April 16th in time to find the Mississippi River at its highest. It is the highest on record in two places, has flooded thousands of acres with the result that many people are homeless. The water came in so swift that some of the people had to move out without any of their goods or stock. The sight is a terrible one. Some houses stand in water and some are completely covered, while in other places the water is up to the second story. The loss is estimated into millions of dollars, and words cannot describe the appearance. For weeks a force of men have been fighting against the flood to save the most valuable part of the bottom land which included about 25,000 acres valued at from \$150 to \$200 per acre.

### THE MILITARY PARADE

IN WHICH 2,500 OVERSEAS TROOPS TOOK PART.

On Wednesday Morning—A Review Held By Col. Hemming On the Cricket Field.

The military parade, in which over 2,500 overseas volunteers took part, was held as part of the celebration on Wednesday morning. It proved to be the best parade of overseas soldiers ever held in the city both from the point of numbers and for appearance. The big body of men under Lieut.-Col. G. Roy as brigadier, included Scottish and school cadets.

The review by Col. T. D. Hemming, D.O.C., with Col. G. Hunter-Ogilvie, A.A.G., and Lieut.-Col. G. H. Gillespie also at the reviewing base, was held at the Cricket Field. The great body of khaki-clad men drew up by units facing the reviewing base over which a large Union Jack waved. The field was filled from Barrie to West streets and never did a body of troops look better. By units the troops made the half circle at the east end of the field and marched past Col. Hemming who took the salute.

The first in line was "C" Battery, R. C. H. A., under Capt. W. E. Steacy. Following "C" Battery was the 13th Kingston Artillery Brigade under Lieut.-Col. E. C. Arnoldi.
