DINNER

Onion Chowder.—Boil one cup of chopped onions with a tablespoon of water, two tablespoons of butter, for half an hour. Be careful not to let them brown. Add slowly to a quart and a half of boiling water. Boil ten minutes and add two cups of raw, diced potatoes. Boil one hour longer.

Scalloped Potatoes.—Slice raw potatoes and place in a baking dish. Season with pepper, salt and butter. When the dish is full cover with cold milk and bake in a moderate oven until potatoes are tender and brown.

BREAKFAST
Creamed Fish.—Mix two cups of minced fish with two cups and a half of boiling milk. Thicken with a tablespoon of dissolved flour. Serve on slices of toast.

LUNCHEON
Boiled Rice.—Stir one cup of washed rice into five cups of boiling, salted water. Boil twenty-five minutes and strain. Cover and stand in a warm place ten minutes.

Creamed Macaroni.—Boil sharply two cups of macaroni for twenty minutes in three cups of water. Pour out half of the water and add two cups of milk. When boiling thicken with a tablespoon of dissolved flour and season with butter, pepper and salt.

Marshmallow Pudding.—Boil together two cups of milk and a half cup of sugar. Thicken with two tablespoons of dissolved cornstarch. Stir in fifteen marshmallows which have been cut fine.
