

So long as their heroic husbands and fathers are fighting with the Allies, Germany will not raise a finger to save from starvation those Belgian women and children in the territory she has overrun. She permits the Belgian Relief Commission to feed them, but her heartless attitude is indicated by the recent torpedoing of two relief ships. Their cargoes were fully insured, of course, as are all shipments made by the Commission, so no contributions were lost. But much anxiety is felt lest even the delay in getting food over may cost precious lives.

For all Belgium is dangerously short of food. Nearly three millions are penniless as well-and the number of these is growing fast as accumulated savings are exhausted.

This means continually growing demands on the Belgian Relief Fund. To meet them more Canadians must contribute, and those who have been giving must be even more liberal. The only alternative is to let our devoted Allies perish!






