**FINANCIAL MATTERS**

Betting that Steel of Canada Reaches 75 by September.

Toronto, June 6.—The statement that Steel of Canada earnings for March were at the rate of nearly 50 per cent. on the common stock was made by interests close in touch with the management. The company's business is steadily expanding, and earnings for the next few months have been steadily climbing, each successive report showing a new high record with last month's topping the lot by a big margin. That 6 per cent. will be declared on the common stock at the next dividend meeting is accepted as certain, and bets were made yesterday that the stock would reach 75 by September.

**Bethlehem Earnings**

New York, June 6.—The March earnings of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation are estimated at \$5,500,000, a new high record. April earnings were slightly less than they were in March. May earnings may pass the March figure. The various plants of the company are operating to full capacity.

**Investors Buy Erie**

New York, June 6.—Erie is being purchased on Wall Street by the same persons who bought more than 100,000 shares of it about four years ago, when President Underwood's policy of improvement first began to make an impression on Wall Street. It is the general opinion that, with a double track to Chicago and with the easiest grades between here and Chicago, Erie ought to make a magnificent showing this year. Wall Street is paying respectful attention and owing to the low price and the good management Erie promises to develop into an active and popular trading issue. Erie is earning dividends even on the common stock now, but there is no prospect of any being paid, even for speculative purposes.

**Big "Melon" For Oil Co.**

Pittsburg, Pa., June 6.—Quaker Oil and Gas Company, a New Oil Co. subsidiary, declared a dividend of a thousand per cent. payable forthwith. The dividend amounts to \$500,000.

**Commercial Notes.**

A. L. Mohler has decided to retire as president of the Union Pacific Railroad Co. and the Oregon Short Line Railroad Co. on July 1st, but will remain with the companies in an advisory capacity.

Robert Reford & Company, Montreal, who have been appointed agents in Halifax for the Cunard Line have purchased for \$33,000 the Newman building, which they will fit up as steamship offices.

Baldwin Locomotive Works has had in contemplation plans for a new munitions plant at Eddystone, Pa., to equal in size the present one, which cost about \$2,000,000.

A large factory for the manufacture of oxygen and liquefied acetylene is to be erected in Winnipeg by a prominent firm of Montreal chemists.

Rumors are afloat regarding a gigantic merger, embracing the Scotia, Steel of Canada, Dominion Steel and Algoma Steel companies.

The Montreal interests who offered to pay 5 1/2 per cent. on the million dollars common stock of the Canadian Electric Co. have withdrawn their offer. A new bid may be made.

Frank D. Lackey, Wilmington, bought a seat on the New York Stock Exchange for \$65,000.

**Survey For Highway**

Prescott, June 5.—Hon. Etlay Mclelland, Minister of Public Works, has instructed a survey to be made shortly of the Ottawa-Prescott highway, approximately sixty miles in extent. This is a project which the municipalities on the route have pressed and petitioned for. After the survey has been made and all data collected it is likely that a commission will be appointed to the highway declared a main road, and come under general legislation.

**Belleville Crossing Accident.**

Belleville, June 5.—An accident occurred at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon at a C. P. R. crossing just east of the city limits when a buggy in which were seated Ernest Howe and Andrew Mitchell was struck by a train. The horse was killed and the buggy torn to pieces, but fortunately the occupants were not fatally injured. They were conveyed to the station here and taken to hospital, where their injuries were attended to.

Belleville, June 5.—The veterans of 1886 who are living in Belleville and vicinity Saturday evening commemorated the anniversary of their leaving this city to do duty by holding a banquet at Hotel Quinte, which event was of a reminiscent nature.
