 With the Chicago Grain Exchange closed Monday Winnipeg prices about steady, no changes were registered on the Toronto Grain board. Trade was quieter all round. Little was reported for export and only odd cars of western wheat and oats were disposed of for domestic account. Little was offering in the way of Ontario grains, excepting wheat. Demand was slow from Ontario millers, who think the price too high.

Winnipeg.
 Winnipeg wheat was up 1/4c and 1/2c on the local market Monday. Oats were unchanged to 1/4c lower. Flax was 1/4c to 1/2c down. The market lacked support, yet the tone was stubbornly firm. In spite of lower cables and generally bearish statistics, including an increase of 500,000 bushels of wheat in stocks at the terminals, Winnipeg held firm for most part of the day. Exporters gave a promise of coming in early in the day, but backed out. Coarse grains were dull. Oats eased off a little in spite of a good cash demand, while flax, after going up 1 1/2c, dropped off. The demand for cash wheat was good for all grades, except No. 1 northern. Offerings were fairly liberal, with exporters the best buyers in both wheat and oats.

One extra choice load of steers, weighing 1,400 pounds, sold at \$9.90 per cwt. Odd prime animals sold at \$10. This was above the market. Good to choice steers and heifers lost 15c to 25c. The bulk of choice weighty steers went at \$9.25 to \$9.65, with a few of \$9.75; handy choice went at \$9 to \$9.35, with good at \$8.65 to \$9, medium at \$8.25 to \$8.50, while common were worth \$7.75 to \$8.25. Butcher cows and bulls of good to choice quality went at \$7.50 to \$8.50, while medium to good at \$6.50 to \$7.50.

The call for milk cows was not as keen as last week, although orders may come later. Some 35 cows were offering, half of them good to choice. Prices were unchanged, \$80 to \$106 being paid for good to choice. The stecker trade was inclined easier, prices ruling at last week's lower levels.

Small meats, which had a bad market last week, found a livelier trade yesterday. Sheep were steady with the drop last week, going at \$6 to \$9.50, heavy being slow sellers, but

light going freely enough. Yearlings of choice grade were wanted, \$10 to \$13.50 per cwt. being paid, while spring lambs were steady with last week's decline at \$8 to \$12.50 each, or around 15 1/2 a pound.

With a meagre supply of hogs on the open market but large consignments at packers' plants, the latter quoted prices 25c below last week at \$9.90 f.o.b. country points, at \$10.25 fed and watered and at \$11.65 off cars. Packers claim that export trade has been cut down for the moment, as British Government authorities have ceased buying here at the prevailing price. One packer stated that they were operating at a loss at the moment because of prices they have to pay.
