MANSLAUGHTER VERDICT.

Bad Indian is Convicted After Third Trial.

Pembroke, June 9.—Peter White-duck, an Indian of the Golden Lake reserve, who with Anthony Jocko, another Indian, shot and killed Turney Robert Coxford, while escaping from the jail here on November 29, 1914, and who was tried for murder on two previous occasions, both juries being unable to agree, was yesterday found guilty of manslaughter and jail-breaking. White-duck was sentenced to fifteen years in the penitentiary on the first count, and five years on the second by Sir Wm. Mulock. Jocko died of wounds received when shot by a posse.

INTENT TO DEFRAUD.

Charge Against F. S. Fredenburg of Ivy Lea.

Brookville, June 9.—F. S. Fredenburg, of Ivy Lea, is charged with obtaining goods from the House of Hobblerin with intent to defraud. Fredenburg was formerly in business at Lansdowne and had business dealings with the firm in question. He was admitted to bail in \$1,500, and the case was set for hearing on June 13th at Brockville police court.
