**IS TO INVESTIGATE**  
**THE COMPLAINT MADE BY PTE. BRYCE DAVIDSON**  
 That Parcels Sent From Kingston to Him in Germany Were Not Received—Next Shipment of Parcels on 20th.  
 United States Consul Johnson has received word from the Department of State that the American ambassador at Berlin has been instructed to investigate the complaint of Bryce Davidson, prisoner of war in Germany, to the effect that he had received very few of the parcels sent to him from Kingston.  
 Sergt. George Lyons, who is now a prisoner of war at Alten Grabow, writes the American consul that he has not received any parcels. He has, however, sent some parcels in the shipment, and no doubt has received them by now. Sergt. Lyons is the only Kingstonian at Alten-Grabow. There are 14 other prisoners, who hail from Toronto and Edmonton.  
 Mr. Johnson would esteem it a favor if those having relatives who are prisoners of war in Germany would give him their addresses in order that parcels might be sent them.  
 The next shipment is to be made on June 20th, when about 160 parcels will be sent. Already over 1,000 parcels have been shipped to prisoners of war in Germany.  
 On Monday a well-known citizen came into the consul's office and wrote out a cheque for \$25 to go towards the prisoners of war fund. He said that he was prepared to do the same every month if necessary.

**CONDITIONS IN WESTPORTSMOUTH COUNCIL**

**G. Y. CHOWN REPORTS THEM IMPROVED.**  
**FOUND THAT JOHN FISHER'S CONTENTION WAS RIGHT.**  
 And That He Was Not Called Upon to Pay a Business Tax for 1916—Additional New Walks to be Laid in the Village.  
 No holder of a liquor license will be called upon to pay a business tax for the year 1916. This has been established by the members of the Westportsmouth Council.  
 Just recently John Fisher, of Fisher's brewery, contended that it was not up to him to pay a business tax. The matter came before the council, and it was decided to inform the Provincial Department in regard to the matter. The result that the council was notified that Mr. Fisher's contention was right, and that he could not be assessed for a business tax.  
 The matter was brought up at the regular meeting of the Westportsmouth Council, on Monday night, and the changes were made in the assessment roll to conform with Mr. Fisher's case.  
 The council decided to go ahead this summer with the work of putting down additional cement walks. About one thousand feet of new walk will be laid, and tenders will be called for the work at once.  
 Reeve Halliday presided at the meeting, and all the members were present, with the exception of Councilor Redden. The latter was in Oshawa on Monday, going there for the purpose of bringing down an automobile to Kingston.

**LIEUT. W. K. MACNEE**  
**OF THE 21ST, HAS RETURNED FROM THE FRONT.**

**TO Become Bomb and Grenade Instructor At Barriefield Camp—He Took Several Courses in England.**  
 Lieut. W. K. Macnee, who went overseas with the 21st Battalion in May, 1915, arrived home early Tuesday morning. He has been appointed bomb and grenade instructor at Barriefield camp, and came home from the front to fill his important position. Lieut. Macnee is ably qualified for the post, as he spent some time at the front, and has taken several courses in England in this essential part of a soldier's training. The work was formerly taught the men chosen for the task in England, but in accordance with the authorities' wish that the men who are sent to England may be fully prepared to go on to France without further training, they have sent officers who have been qualified in this work, both by experience at the front and by the courses of instruction in England, to aid in the instruction of the men in the training camps of Canada.  
 The Whig was in conversation with Lieut. Macnee for a short time Tuesday morning, and found him looking very well indeed. The life of a soldier has agreed with him, as it does with nearly every other man, and he seems ably fitted to set out upon his work of instructing recruits in the art of throwing bombs and grenades. This work requires much skill and strength on the part of the men. It is now used extensively at the front, and special men are chosen. It will be remembered that the late Lance Corporal "Scotty" Davidson was a bomb thrower when he was killed in action.  
 Lieut. Macnee has reported to Col. T. D. R. Hemming for duty, and is arranging for the instruction.

**THE LATE JOHN E. TWIGG.**  
 Funeral Took Place to Cataract Cemetery on Tuesday Afternoon.  
 The funeral of the late John E. Twigg took place Tuesday afternoon from his late residence on Earl street to St. George's Cathedral, where service was conducted by the Rev. Cecil Whalley. After the service the remains were taken to Cataract Cemetery, where interment took place. Ferguson Twigg, Toronto, son of the deceased, and his brother, William A. Twigg, were the chief mourners. Those who acted as pall-bearers were: H. F. Price, William Campbell, A. McMahon, George Mahood, F. J. Hoag, and George Dick. The large number of floral tributes testified to the high esteem and respect in which the deceased was held by his large number of friends.

**A WOMAN COMPLAINED**  
 That Neighbor Made Uncomplimentary Remarks About Her.
