London, June 14.—Kovel, next to Lemberg the most important railroad centre back of the eastern Austrian line, is WILL now, with Lemberg and Czernowitz, in Bukowina, one of the immediate objectives of the Russian drive. Its capture would prove a serious embarrassment to the lines of the Germans toward Riga and those of the Austrians to the south.

The Russians have approached Kovel the closest in the territory west of Lutsk. Further indentation of the Austrian line here would give them an opportunity to gain their objective by both frontal attack from Rafalowka and flanking from the south. At these points the Russian attackers can be kept constantly munitioned by their own railroad lines running back
