### FARM HELP SCARCE.

Col. Hunter Could Place 120 Men And 40 Women.

Farm labor is very scarce in this district. Lieut. Col. Hunter, immigration agent, told the Whig that he could place 120 men and boys and 40 women and girls.

The colonel attributes the scarcity of male farm help to different causes. One is that a number of helpers have enlisted; another is that several have sought work in factories making war supplies, while a third is that there is no supply, an immigrant not having for months called on Col. Hunter in search of work.

Wages, in consequence of the demand being greater than the supply, have materially advanced.

### Want Stone Pile Abolished.

The Grand Jury of the General Sessions recommends the abolition of the stone pile at the penitentiary and the separation of younger convicts from the older and more hardened ones. It finds that more accommodation is required for nurses at the General Hospital. The jurymen find the various charitable institutions in good condition. Mention is made that the jail is in excellent condition, and has 19 inmates, 16 males and 3 females.
