Dead—Lieuts. Fife, Hugh W. Macdonnell, Corp. F. G. Martyn, Pte. S. Creighton. The last two were undergraduates of Queen's Corp. Martyn's home was in Mitchell, while Pte. Creighton came from London. Lieut. Macdonnell was a Kingstonian, while Lieut. Fife was a westerner.
