### COUNTY COUNCIL IS ASKED

FOR INCREASED GRANT TO THE PATRIOTIC FUND.

For July the Frontenac Dependents Will Receive About \$1,800, While the Council Pays \$1,250 to the Fund.

The County Council on Thursday afternoon was addressed by J. M. Wyatt, a representative of the Canadian Patriotic Fund Committee, Ottawa, who asked that the council increase its monthly grant of \$1,250 to the fund. He pointed out that last January, when the grant was made, Frontenac was getting only \$322 from the fund for dependents of enlisted soldiers. For the month of June this amount was increased to \$1,526.50, and for July it would likely be \$1,800, with still further monthly increases as the war went on.

Warden Halliday assured Mr. Wyatt that the council would give the matter careful consideration, and he was sure it would make a satisfactory increase.

Councillor Kennedy thought that \$2,000 a month might be paid into the fund till the council met in its November session.

Auditor Muir, when asked for some information as to how much of the \$30,000, voted by the council for patriotic purposes, had been expended, replied that there was \$23,750 left. If the grant was increased to \$2,000 a month there would be \$11,750 left at the end of the year.

The council adjourned till Friday morning after referring the matter to the finance committee for report.

### RETURNED SOLDIER DEAD

J. REID, HAVELOCK, PASSED AWAY IN MOWAT HOSPITAL.

Went Overseas With 6th Mounted Rifles, But Was Invalided Home After Doing His Duty on the Battlefield.

After having done his bit at the front it was the lot of Liman Jacob Reid that he should be invalided home and die as no soldier wishes to do, but as force of circumstances compels one to do, not on the field of honor, but in a hospital. However, the young man, who was only nineteen years of age, has made the supreme sacrifice for the honor of his country, and no man can do more. The deceased young man, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Reid, Havelock, was born in Madoc, and when the need of his country fully came to him he enlisted with the 6th Mounted Rifles. After undergoing the hardships of training he was sent to England with his unit, and later went to France, where he did his duty like a man.

While there he became ill, and was invalided home last fall. He was sent to the Mowat Memorial Hospital, and in spite of every precaution he gradually became worse and passed away Thursday from respiration failure. Besides his parents, who reside in Havelock, there are left to mourn his loss one brother, Charles, and two sisters, Edna and Leota, all of whom live in Havelock.

GERMANS FEAR RUSSIA

"The Russian is Terrible," Say Tenth Army Officers

As to the qualities and characteristics of the various non-Teutonic soldiers of Europe the German army officers speak interestingly and not without generosity, says the New York Times. The French soldier is gallant, nervous and very brave, only it is difficult to make him return a second or third time in to the same fire. The English fighter is dogged and individually resourceful. The Italian, though ferocious in assault, is discouraged by failure. He goes on one impulse and hates to repeat his own deed for a second charge. That is how a German sees three of his adversaries. As to the fourth, he volunteers nothing, but if he is pressed, he will add: "The Russian is terrible."

The meaning of that assertion develops slowly, with many hesitations. It is not that the individual Russian soldier is particularly terrible. No, that is not what he means to say. The Russian cannot be singularized. You have to think of Russians, in finite in plurality, a slow-moving, ominous, imposing mass. They come in lines ten and twelve deep, heedless and heedless, so controlled by their own momentum that they cannot stop. They will go anywhere, into anything, again and again, as if they did not know how to be afraid. "The only thing you can do," says the German officer, "is to slaughter them and pray that you will have ammunition enough to keep it up."
