COUNTY COUNCIL'S BUDGET

THE FIRST THIS BODY HAS EVER ADOPTED.

Provides for Tax of 1-2 Mills For General Purposes and Expenditure of \$74,621.88.

The Frontenac County Council decided on Friday morning to adopt a budget, the first in its history. The law requires every municipal council to adopt an estimate of its revenue and expenditure for the year, and on recommendation of the Finance Committee, of which Councillor Franklin is chairman, the Council decided to adopt the following budget, which will require a tax of 1-2 mills, not including the good roads tax and the provincial war tax:

Applications for grants were received from the Kingston Industrial Fair Association and the South Frontenac Farmers' Institute. The money by-laws read on Thursday were given a final reading and passed.

A by-law was read to authorize the treasurer to borrow \$25,000 from the Bank of Toronto for current expenditure.

On the suggestion of Councillor Spankie, the Council decided to ask Lieut.-Col. Low, commanding the 146th Battalion, to address it at 2 p.m. with regard to a further grant to that unit.

The Finance Committee has decided to recommend to Council that the county grant to the Canadian Patriotic Fund be increased to \$2,000 a month.

New Pastor of Queen Street Church and Wife in Kingston. Rev. J. D. Ellis and wife arrived in the city on Friday afternoon from Toronto, where they have been visiting their son, who is a member of the Aviation Corps under instruction, there.

Mr. Ellis is the new pastor of Queen Street Methodist Church, and will preach his inaugural sermon on Sunday. The couple were met at the station by a deputation from the Ladies' Aid and the Official Board, and were heartily welcomed. Mr. Ellis comes to the work with a high reputation as a pastor, a business man, and a preacher. He is the chairman of the Kingston Methodist district, a native of Renfrew County, and well known throughout Eastern Ontario. The parsonage has been undergoing repairs; repainting, and refurnishing during his week.

In Bivouac: And Barracks

Lieut. O'Leary arrived from Ottawa this afternoon with a number of recruits for the 73rd Battery. One of the recruits is William Dennis, of Hull, whose father and four brothers are in uniform.

Gunner Leslie Harding, of the 73rd Battery, who enlisted in Ottawa and came to headquarters at Kingston, grew homesick, and after three days of military life pined for a sight of the capital city. He took French leave and went home. Correspondence between Kingston and Ottawa took place, with the result that Gunner Harding was to-day brought back to Kingston. The youth did not realize the seriousness of his offence.

The order for the 146th Battalion to go to Valcartier has not been cancelled, and the present indications are that the battalion will proceed to the Quebec camp within a few days.

The 146th Battalion will parade for divine service Sunday morning at 11 o'clock to Macdonald Park.

The four batteries now stationed in Kingston will be moved in the near future to Barriefield Camp to take the places vacated by the 130th and 136th Battalions.

THEATRICAL NEWS

At the Grand.

The last three days of this week sees another splendid programme of vaudeville and pictures being presented at the Grand Opera House. Hazel Dawn, one of the favorite actresses of Kingston picture fans, is seen in a novel modern photoplay drama, "The Saleslady." In this picture Miss Dawn is seen at her best as the subject gives her wide scope for her many talents. A two-reel "Universal photoplay," "On the Level," a comedy picture, "Scattered Nerves," and the Paramount Travel series, showing the beautiful cities of South America, were also shown and proved excellent entertainment. The vaudeville is the best seen in the city for some time. Henry Ferrer is a comedy juggler act far surpassing anything in this line seen at the Grand in some time; his work caused favorable comment by the audience. Scott and Campbell, in a rural comedy singing and talking act, is also good. Special scenery is carried in this act, which is very interesting from beginning to end. They were loudly applauded throughout the whole piece. This same bill will be repeated to-night and also on Saturday matinee and night.

At the Strand.

"The Habit of Happiness," the 5-act Triangle play, featuring that peerless screen and legitimate star Douglas Fairbanks, headed the bill at the Strand last evening. Dorothy's father immediately suspects the Italian, who had called and lays a trap for him in his flower shop. At this point the film version of the vaudeville act, with which everyone is familiar, is brought to a gripping climax on the screen.

Again the two entertainments at Lake Ontario Park last evening were largely attended, and enthusiasm was manifested by the crowd.
