LIVE STOCK MARKETS Montreal, June 27.—Cattle were 25 cents down for lower grades owing to a large run on the live stock market this morning. Hogs were 50 cents up, while sheep were a quarter of a cent lower.

Toronto, June 27.—Prices were: Export cattle, choice \$9.75 to \$10.25, butcher cattle, choice \$9.50 to \$9.75, medium \$9 to \$9.40, common \$8 to \$8.90; butcher cows, choice \$7.50 to \$8.50, medium \$7 to \$7.40, canners \$5 to \$6; bulls \$6 to \$8.75; feedings steers, \$8 to \$9; stockers, choice \$7.50 to \$8, light \$7 to \$7.50, choice milkers \$75 to \$100 each; springers \$75 to \$100.

Chicago, June 27.—Cattle receipts, 1,000 market firm. Prices: Beeves \$7.50 to \$11.40; stockers and feeders \$5.75 to \$8.75; cows and heifers, \$3.75 to \$9.75; calves, \$8.50 to \$12.
