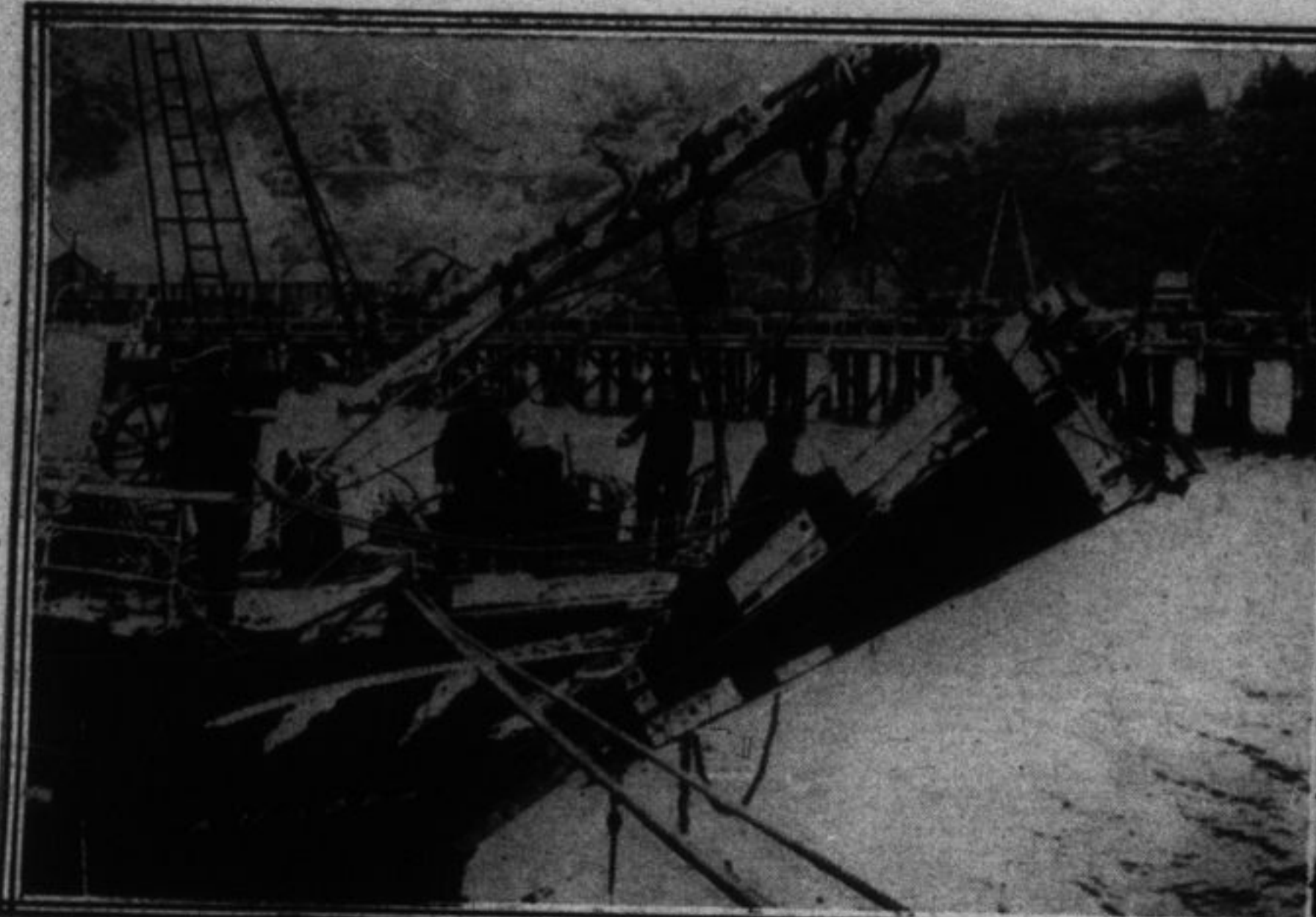




ARMORED FRENCH TRAIN IN THE VOSGES MOUNTAINS IN ACTION.

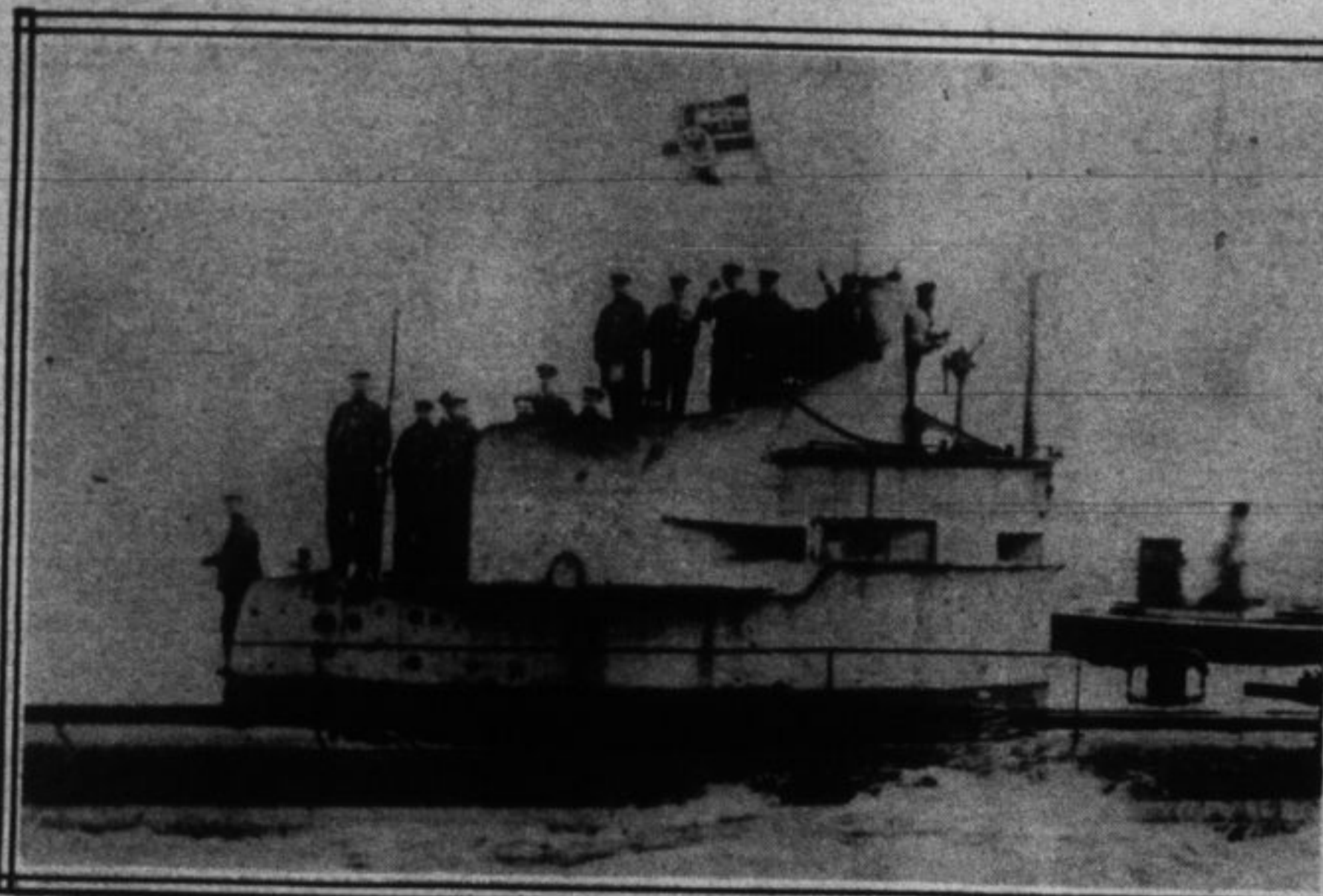

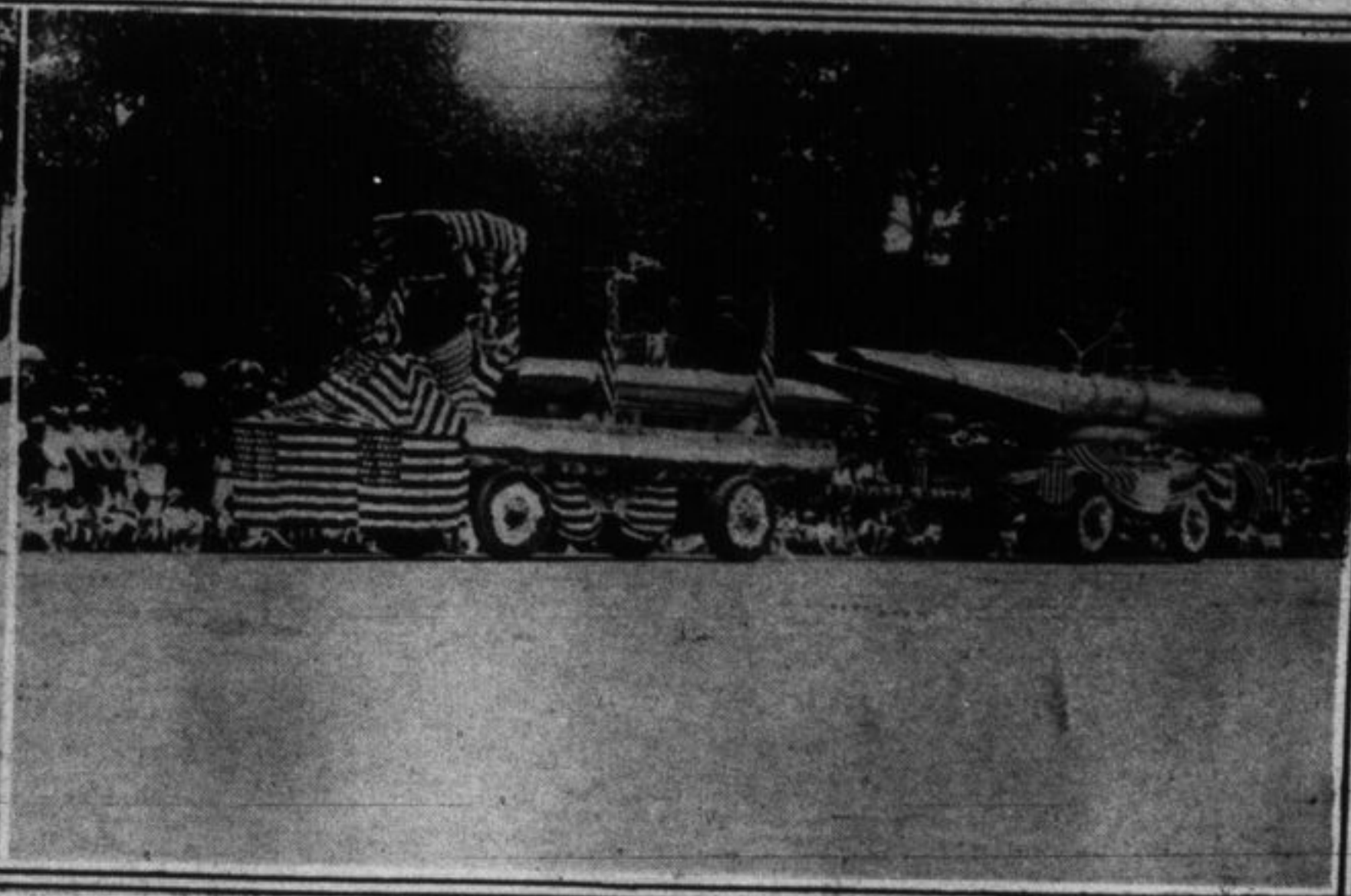
WITH THE AUSTRALIANS IN FRANCE. A scene in the Anzac trenches. Note the new helmets and the American Lewis gun used by the soldiers.

PREPAREDNESS PARADE IN WASHINGTON. Photo shows two of the floats in the parade which was headed by President Wilson.



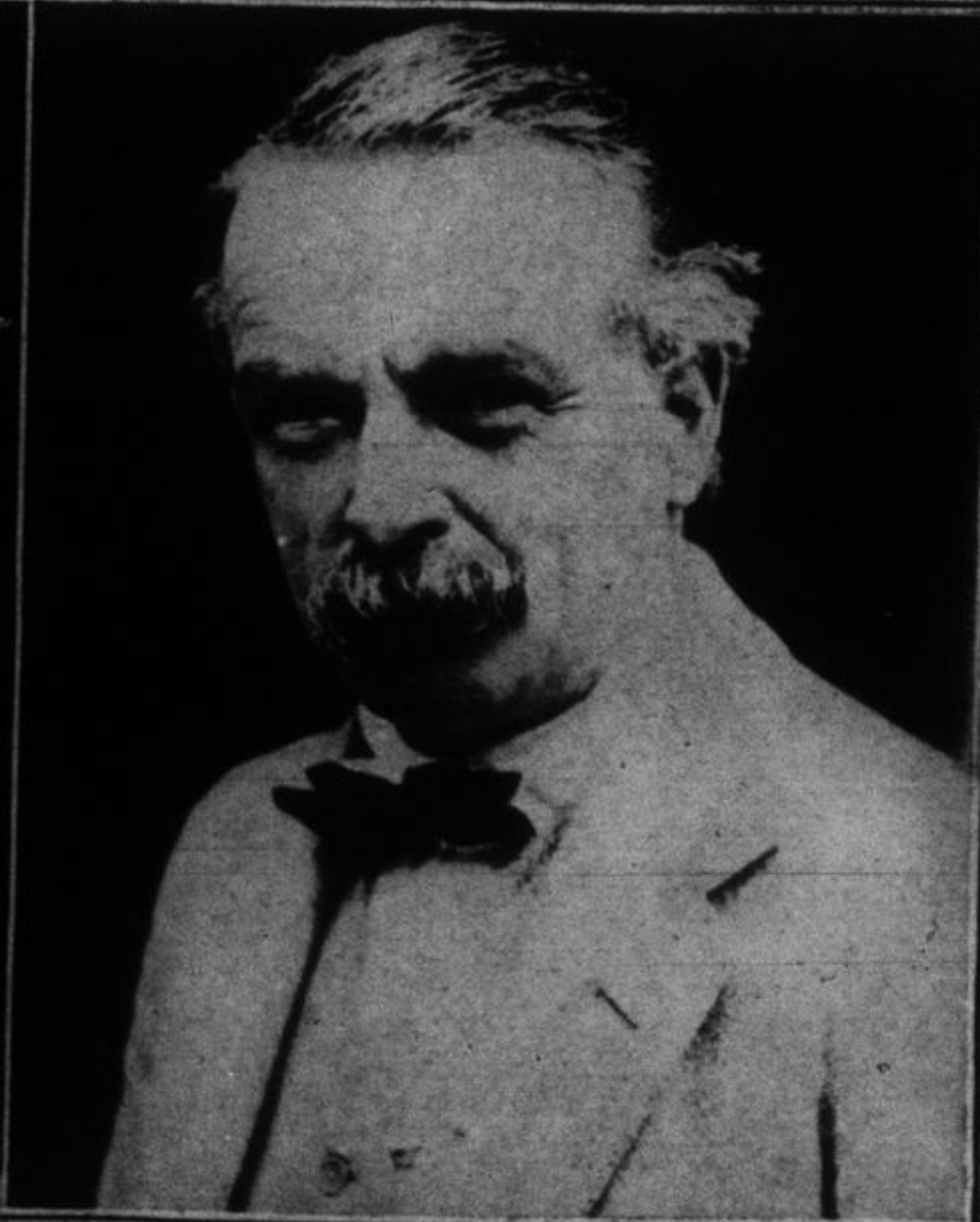
