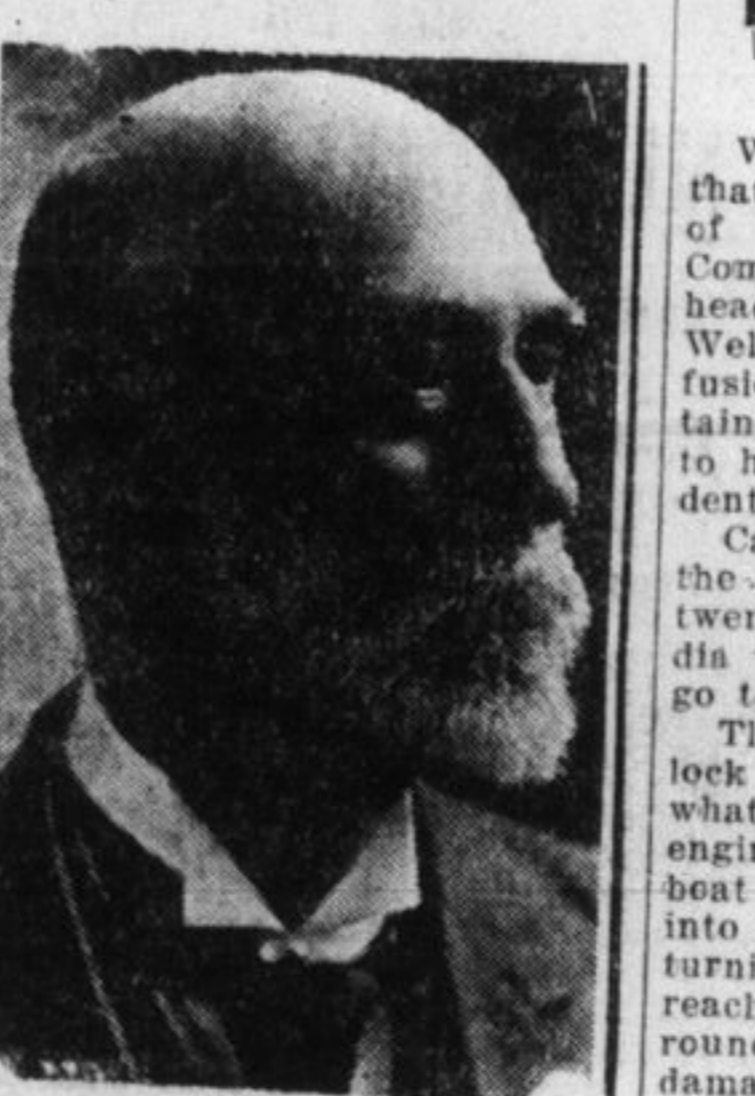

THE MOST THRILLING EVENT

IN PRESENT WAR DESCRIBED BY MRS. CARR-HARRIS

At the Crusaders' Camp Meeting Thursday Night, Which Was Held in the First Baptist Church.

"In the Present War" was the subject of Mrs. Carr-Harris' address at the Crusaders' meeting in the First Baptist church, Thursday night. It was the moment when a Lancashire regiment and a regiment of Gurkhas dashed up the slopes of Sari Bair in Gallipoli and looking down from Europe into Asia over the narrows where there had been the British fleet to the west and with Constantinople in the dim distance to the east they ran down the crest on the other side the crown of glory in their grasp, for the Turk was flying before them.

But at this moment one of the saddest things in the history of the world happened. A British column, which was to have reinforced the Lancashire regiment, lost its way in the dark and at the supreme moment when reinforcements they could have carried everything before them they were thrown into confusion, for when the Turks on seeing the mere handful of men assumed the offensive. The fate of the dazzling city to the east was changed in a moment. Constantinople was lost. The narrows were lost, and in the few days that followed thirty thousand of our splendid men were lost. The speaker used the incident as an illustration of how many lose their way to the golden city and to victory.
