**SUNSHINE IS NOW NEEDED**

TO RIPEN THE CROP OF STRAW-BERRIES AND RASPBERRIES.

Just At Present the Outlook is Rather Uncertain, But Believed That Fruit Will Pan Out All Right.

What about the fruit crop this season? The Whig interviewed a leading fruit dealer on Friday, and from the information he secured it would appear that it is not known just how the crop will pan out. If fine weather continues it is stated that there should be a good crop, but with so much rain as has prevailed for so long, it is difficult to say just how the crop will turn out.

A spell of warm weather is needed for the strawberries, which have commenced to arrive in the city in larger quantities and at a lower price. There was quite a rush of berries in the city on Thursday morning, and sales were made at three boxes for a quarter, but in the afternoon dealers were disposing of them at two boxes for a quarter. In the course of a few days it is expected that the price will drop again. There is a keen demand for strawberries in Kingston.

For some time disquieting reports have been coming in from Western Ontario concerning the fruit crop, which some time ago promised to be a bumper crop. One report from a dealer at Grimsby stated that where a large yield of fruit had been promised in the Niagara district a month or more ago, the wet weather had affected the crops, and a difference was now shown in plums, it was stated, were dropping off the trees in large quantities, and there would be but a small crop. Peaches had also suffered from the rain, and were dropping off, but there would be a fair crop.

The report also stated that straw-berries and raspberries are good, and that there would be a fine yield if the district is lucky enough to get sufficient sunshine.

**Recruiting Injured in Frontenac.**

Wolfe Island, June 28.—(To the Editor): The action of the Minister of Militia in sending the 146th to Valcartier has very much injured recruiting in Frontenac. All through the county where recruiting meetings were held throughout the winter, Lieut.-Col. Low appealed to the eligible men to enlist in their home battalion and said they would be mobilized and drilled right here at home until such time as they were ready to go overseas. Now, just as they are up to strength they are sent to Quebec, and we understand a new battalion is to be raised in Kingston. Will the men now have faith in the same promises? I hardly think so. It is such actions as these that hurt recruiting. Had Dr. Edwards been as "big" a man as Mr. Burnham, he would have said, "No," the 146th will not go to Valcartier; or is he interested in who the commanding officer of the new battalion will be, and for that reason allowing the 146th to be sent away, thereby breaking the promises which I believe were made in good faith by the recruiting officers throughout the county to those joining the 146th.—**FAIR PLAY.**

**REGISTRY OFFICE REPORT**

**BUSINESS AT LOCAL OFFICES FALLING OFF.**

By Decrease in Number of Instruments Registered—Marked Slump in Receipts.  
 The annual report of the Inspector of registry offices for Ontario contains some interesting figures concerning the Frontenac and Kingston offices.  
 The Kingston office, J. P. Gilder-sleeve, registrar, registered 978 instruments, the fees being \$1,755.90. The number of instruments registered in 1913 was 3,484.  
 There were 277 mortgages registered, the aggregate amount being \$464,934. The mortgages discharged numbered 234. Forty wills and 310 deeds were registered. The gross amount of fees was \$1,528.55, the net amount received by the registrar being \$1,002.49. In 1914 the registrar received \$1,395.19, and in 1913, \$2,374.90.

**County Office.**  
 The number of instruments registered in the Frontenac office, W. J. Gibson, registrar, was 1,210, the fees totalling \$1,495.50. In 1913 the number registered was 1,394.  
 There were 290 mortgages registered and 292 discharges. The aggregate value of the mortgages registered was \$424,065.75. Sixty wills and 432 deeds were registered.  
 The gross amount of fees earned for the year was \$2,123.30. The net amount received by the registrar was \$1,516.70. In 1914 it was \$1,543.50, and in 1913, \$1,764.30.
