### THE SCHOOL OF INFANTRY

RECENT AMENDMENTS TO MILITIA ORDER ARE GIVEN.

There Has Been Some Misunderstanding in Connection With the Attendance of Officers and N.C.O's.

Camp orders contain the following about the infantry course of instruction:

(1) With reference to infantry schools of instruction, M.O. No. 31, 1916, members of C.E.F. referred to in para. 2, included those who enlist in the expeditionary force for the purpose of attending such schools and who are considered by the commandant of the school as suitable candidates.

(2) Provincial officers of militia who have expressed in writing their willingness to serve overseas may be permitted to attend schools of instruction in the same manner as members of the C.E.F. Qualified officers of the active militia may also be permitted to attend on the same conditions regarding overseas service, but without expense to the public.

**THINK CAMP SAVINGS BANK**

**SHOULD BE STARTED AT BARRIEFIELD FOR SOLDIERS,**

Who Carry a Total of \$200,000 in Cash Around in their Pockets—No Place to Put It.

The chaplains at Barriefield camp have interested themselves in a subject that should prove of great interest to every soldier at the camp. It is the establishment of a saving bank. Every two weeks a cash is paid out in the cashing of cheques for the men. This money is distributed in \$5, \$10, \$20, or lesser amounts throughout the 6,000 men, and carried by them until sent to their homes or put into banks.

Some time before the camp opened, the proposition advanced by Mrs. Torrance, of the city, to have a "penny bank" installed was turned down by the Bank of Montreal. This idea was to have a bank as simply a place where money could be deposited without interest. This would give the bank operating the branch the use of at least \$100,000 a month, which amount would probably keep increasing. No interest was to be paid, but the men were to be allowed to deposit or withdraw as they wished.

The bank, evidently thinking that not enough profit could be made, turned down the scheme.

A new plan is now being advanced. This is to have a branch savings bank installed. The usual freedom and restriction of any bank would be imposed, and the regular rate of interest would be paid on all accounts. Unofficially as far as can be learned, the bank does not want anything to do with this idea either.

Something should be done for a number of reasons can be given on the advantage that a savings bank would be to the boys in khaki. These men are in the camp during the time that the city banks are open. They are then busily engaged with their drilling, etc. In the meanwhile carrying the money around in their pockets. On the principle that "it burns a hole in their pocket," much is spent on ice cream, etc., which would otherwise be deposited and used for the essential needs of the men's families.
