To Value of \$60,000 Sold to Toronto Company.

The Toronto Star says:—Wood, Gundy & Co., of Toronto, have been awarded \$60,000 of city of Kingston 5 per cent debentures, issued for patriotic purposes, repayable 1936. The issue will cost the city about 5.10 per cent.

QUEEN'S SUMMER SCHOOL A UNIQUE FLOWER SERVICE

OPENING EXERCISES TOOK PLACE ON MONDAY.

Address of Welcome Delivered by Dr. Gordon—Enrolment is Satisfactory—Many Officers and Students Have Gone Overseas.

Queen's summer school opened Monday with a satisfactory enrolment. The attendance will not be so large this year as in past years, owing to so many students and would-be students enlisting, but it promises to be better than was expected.

Dr. Gordon, at the opening, delivered an address of welcome and gave an interesting sketch of the history of Queen's University. J. T. Curtis, of Ottawa, past president of the Summer School Association, replied, and gave some timely advice to the new students.

There has been a new subject added to the curriculum, which is known as the Strathcona physical training course. It will be in charge of Miss Eva Jamieson, of Brockville. The course is under the joint control of the Militia Department and of the Department of Education. It is not obligatory, but it is required by the Department of Education of the principals of many Public schools.

The president of the Summer School Association, H. J. Vallentyne, principal of a Toronto Public school, has gone overseas, as have many other officers and students. One of the lecturers, Prof. Willim, has also enlisted.

During the session of the school there will be two lectures each week by members of the school and prominent citizens. These lectures will be given on Monday and Friday afternoons at five o'clock, and will begin next week.

Prof. W. T. MacClement is director of the school, and presided at the opening exercises. The school will last six weeks.
