PUT TRUST IN BATTLESHIPS WOMAN IS BEING HELD

RATHER THAN IN THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO. CLAIMED THAT SHE ELOPED WITH MAN IN KHAKI.

Captain Dods, of the 109th Battalion, Thinks This is Explanation of Present War—Stirring Sermon Preached in Sydenham Street Church.

That the nations have been putting their trust in battleships rather than in the Prince of Peace, was the conclusion to be drawn from an eloquent and stirring sermon preached in Sydenham Street Methodist church Sunday night by Capt. Dods, chaplain of the 155th Battalion.

Capt. Dods took for his text Hebrews III, 4: "For every house is builded by some man; but he that built all things is God."

In order that a house might stand it must be built upon a stable foundation, the preacher declared. And that, he said, was the foundation of the earth, upon the everlasting rock, Jesus Christ.

The great powers now engaged in mortal combat seemed to have put their trust in battleships rather than in an unseen Power. Battleships of a coast, but there was something higher and nobler. It was better for neighbors to dwell together as brothers than to be separated by a fence that reached even to the very heavens; and what was true of men was true of nations.

Instead, however, of building a temple of peace, the nations had erected the hideous superstructure of militarism. The result was that the war lords had plunged Europe into a sea of blood, the waves of which had drenched Canada.

The preacher concluded by urging all present to do their best for their church, their country and their God, so that when the brave lords who had gone forth to war returned those who had been left they would find that those whom they left behind had not been asleep, but had taken a big step forward in the religious life.

STORY OF STABBING IS GIVEN A DENIAL. Information Given Military Headquarters To This Effect. Last week a story was in circulation to the effect that a resident of Division street had been stabbed by a soldier, while in the act of defending a woman. The soldier according to the story, was a member of the 146th Battalion.

As soon as the military authorities heard of the case (through the Whig) an order was issued that in future side-arms were not to be worn. George Payne, contractor, informed the military headquarters on Monday morning, that he saw the whole incident and the facts of the case completely exonerated the man in khaki. The man, he says, was coming home, evidently under the influence of liquor, and was carrying a bottle in his coat pocket. He fell, and the bottle broke cutting his chest.

And That Couple Have Been Living in Kingston For the Past Four Weeks—Soldier is Married Man And Has Five Children and Woman Has Three.

Charging that she deserted her husband and three children, at Maxville, Ont., and came to Kingston to live with a soldier, a woman, about twenty-five years of age, was taken into custody on Sunday night, by the military and city police and is now being held at the police station, and in the meantime her case is being further investigated.

The woman was placed under arrest at a house on the Raglan Road, and it is alleged that for the past four weeks, she has been living there with the soldier, who just at the present time cannot be located. The soldier, so it is claimed, has a wife and five children who reside near Maxville.

Given Three Months. The woman who gave the name of Mrs. Hutt was arraigned before Magistrate Farrell at noon on Monday and was charged with vagrancy. She was found guilty and the magistrate sentenced her to three months in all.

Brant, and he enlisted at Deseronto last January. He was given a month's leave of absence, from May 8th to June 8th, to work with a farmer. He did not, however, turn up at the end of his furlough, and was arrested at Deseronto by Lieut. Wilson on July 7th.

Reilly, who has been principal of the Moyrean School, Sask., has arrived in the city for the purpose of enlisting as a gunner in Queen's Battery. Mr. Reilly graduated from Queen's University in the spring of 1915 and went west immediately. Previous to entering Queen's University he was principal of St. Mary's school, Kingston.
