**HEARD AN ASSAULT CASE**

**FOLLOWING LIVELY ROW IN A YARD ON PRINCESS STREET**

Magistrate Fined Alexander Abramsky \$5 and Costs for Striking Mrs. James Grant With a Whip—Trouble Arose Over Space In Yard.

As a result of the row which took place at the rear of a store on Upper Princess street, on Thursday afternoon, Alexander Abramsky was fined \$5 and costs, on Friday morning, by Magistrate Farrell, on a charge of assaulting Mrs. James Grant. Over an hour was taken up in the hearing of the evidence. T. J. Rigney appeared for Mrs. Grant and A. B. Cunningham for the accused, who pleaded "not guilty," and declared that he had struck Mrs. Grant with a whip in self defence.

Mrs. Grant told about her husband and Abramsky having an altercation. She saw Abramsky hit her husband and ran to his assistance calling out "don't hit my husband." She said that she tried to pull Abramsky away from her husband, and that Abramsky hit her with the whip. She had quite a nasty wound on the side of her head.

A batch of witnesses were called to give evidence in the case but it appeared that the trouble arose over the fact that Abramsky had his rig on Grant's side of the yard. Grant said that he had asked Abramsky to keep the whip in his own yard.

Ethel Nokes, daughter of Grant, said she saw Abramsky hit her father with his fist and afterwards with a whip.

Abramsky, in his evidence, declared that Grant had made a threat that he would kill any person who would trespass on his yard. Witness challenged him to go ahead and do it. Afterwards he had "a narrow escape," as he termed it, and he simply used the whip in self defence.

Magistrate Farrell held that there was no excuse for Abramsky having used the whip in the way he did, and imposed a fine of \$5 and costs.

**VETERAN SOLDIER PASSES**

**RICHARD WILSON DIED FRIDAY. AGED SEVENTY-SEVEN.**

Was Born in England, and Came to Canada Fifty Years Ago With Old North-West Rebellions.

At seven o'clock Friday morning the death occurred in the Kingston General Hospital of Richard Wilson, who for a great number of years had been a citizen of Kingston. The deceased, who was an employee of the British American Hotel for twenty-six years, was forced to retire, owing to ill-health, about six years ago. However, he had really been ill only since August last, and died this morning after an attack of paralysis.

The deceased was born in Gloucestershire, England, seventy-seven years ago, and came out to Canada with the old Rifle Brigade about fifty years ago. He served in the first north-west rebellion under Lord Wolseley, and also in the second rebellion in 1885. He also acted in the defense of Canada during the Fenian raids, and for these acts was the recipient of medals in recognition of his services. He had been a faithful employee of the British American, and the management was loath to lose his services when he was forced to retire.

The late Mr. Wilson, who resided at 92 Upper William street, was well known around the city, and his death is regretted by a large circle of friends. He was an Anglican in religion, and was a member of St. James' church. In politics he was a Conservative. He was a member of Lodge No. 29, C.O.C.F.

Besides his wife, he is survived by six children: Harry, Australia; Dr. W. G., North Battleford, Sask.; William R., Amsterdam, N.Y.; Bessie, Annie and Florence, at home.

The funeral will be on Monday of a private nature and conducted by Rev. T. W. Savary.
