The property and police committee at Renfrew recommended the appointment of John Toohy as assistant chief of police.

Rev. J. W. S. Lowry, Carleton Place, has volunteered his services to the government and has been accepted for a chaplaincy.

Renfrew is yet without a model school principal, W. T. Wright, Dundalk, who applied and was accepted, having changed his mind.

F. R. Curry, Brockville, has received word that his son, Capt. F. C. Curry, had been wounded in action on July 10th and was being treated in an English military hospital.

On Thursday morning, the barn owned by Walter Lingham, Belleville, was struck by lightning, and within an hour was burned to the ground.

Frank Courvett of Renfrew, was arrested in Ottawa on a charge of theft of a handbag. The stolen property was recovered at the Minto Hotel, where Courvett was staying.

E. Hamby, office manager for MacArthur Brothers Company, at Hope, B. C., has accepted the position of private secretary to the company's general manager at New York. Mr. Hamby is a former Bellevillian.

Captain Eaton and Messrs Arthur P. Selby and F. T. Curley have made a record in fishing at Catagogie Lake by successfully landing a maskinonge having a length of three feet, six inches, and weighing twenty-four pounds.

Miss Marian Bottomley, who has been teaching school near Augusta, spent the week-end in Athens, and left Monday for Rootstown, Ohio, to spend the long vacation with her mother and sister, Mrs. (Rev.) Line-waver.

Fred. Arnold, a nephew of H. H. Arnold, was in Athens last week for a short time. He has just returned from Europe, where he received a slight dose of gas while executing his duties in one of the mechanical transport sections.

25 LODGES AT TRENTON.

Appeal to Orangemen to Strengthen the 235th Battalion.

Belleville, July 14.—An Orange demonstration was held in Trenton on Wednesday, in which twenty-five lodges from all parts of the district participated, including Trenton, Frankford, Belleville, Colborne, Belleville, Wooler, Springbrook, Marmora, Deseronto, and Bayside. There were many visitors in town for the "walk."

At Firemen's Park speeches were delivered. Ex-Mayor Jaques was chairman. Mayor Ireland gave an address of welcome. Grand Chaplain Rev. Doris Nicholls, of Port Perry, addressed the gathering on the great foundations of the Orange order.

A recruiting address was delivered by Capt. Rev. W. G. Clarke, Bowmansville, who spoke to the men of Northumberland and Durham on behalf of the 235th Battalion, of which he is chaplain. He pointed out that the post of danger was the post of duty. The principles for which William of Orange fought were again at stake in the war with Germany.

Orangemen at Renfrew. Renfrew, July 14.—The Orangemen of Renfrew county, joined by those of Ottawa and suburbs, making in all about thirty lodges, held a celebration in Renfrew Wednesday.

A resolution was adopted pledging the Orangemen of Renfrew county to do all in their power to facilitate the enlistment of 500,000 Canadians. None of the speakers made any reference to the bilingual question. One of them, Rev. A. White, of Renfrew, referred to the fact that in Belfast this year, with Irishmen united to fight a common foe, there was no 12th of July demonstration.

Some time ago Mrs. George Davis, Merrickville, received a telegram stating that her husband, Pte. Davis, had died of wounds in a Liverpool hospital. It now transpires that this is a case of mistaken identity and Pte. Davis is very much alive.

Cheese Factory Burned.

Brockville, July 13.—On Wednesday morning the Roebuck cheese and box factory was discovered in flames by Alford Anderson. An alarm was raised, and neighbors chopped a hole in the side of the building and saved a few cheese and some boxes of rennet. The building was destroyed, entailing a loss of \$3,000, covered by insurance. The origin is a mystery. Six months ago a factory on the same site was destroyed. The owner is Mr. Lindsay.

On Thursday the death occurred of Pte. George Smith, of the 92nd Battalion, in Onwanada Hospital, after an illness extending for several weeks. The deceased was seized with pneumonia while at Barriefield Camp, and was taken to the hospital for treatment. In spite of every precaution and every means taken to relieve him, he passed away Thursday, much to the regret of his comrades, who held him in great esteem.

A short service was conducted at S. S. Corbett's undertaking parlors today by Rev. Capt. Hagar, chaplain of the 156th Battalion, and the remains were then sent on the G.T.R. train to Peterboro, accompanied by his wife. The deceased was only thirty-five years of age.
