### A RECRUITING CONFERENCE

IMPORTANT MEETING HELD IN CITY HALL.

Object is to Stimulate Recruiting in This Military District — Was Thought Likely — Conscription Would be Discussed.

A conference for the purpose of devising ways and means to stimulate recruiting in the third military district is being held in the City Hall this (Friday) afternoon. Addresses will be given by Lieut.-Col. G. H. Williams, recruiting officer for No. 2 military district, and by Lieut.-Col. Hamilton, recruiting officer for this military district. Representatives are present from a number of municipalities.

It was thought possible that the question of conscription would come up and that possibly the meeting would decide to memorialize the Government to do something along that line.

Col. Hamilton, in conversation with the Whig, reported recruiting as slow, and said that something must be done to stir the people up to a lively sense of their duty.
