### LIQUOR CHARGES HEARD

#### HEAVY PENALTIES WERE IMPOSED IN FOUR CASES.

A Fine of \$300 and Costs or Three Months in Jail Imposed on Four Men—Four Cases Dismissed and Three Withdrawn.

Heavy penalties were imposed by Magistrate Farrell, in four liquor cases heard on Friday afternoon.

Wilson Teeple, Patrick Burns, William McElrath, and David J. Bowman, for selling without a license were each fined \$300 and costs, or three months in jail. The fine will not likely be paid in any of the four cases.

Andrew Hill pleaded guilty, through his counsel, T. J. Rigney, to a charge of allowing liquor to be consumed at his restaurant on Brock street, and was fined \$20 and costs or one month in jail.

There were eight other charges of a similar nature in the docket. Four were dismissed, three were withdrawn, and judgment was reserved in another.

Provincial Inspector Morrison and the local Inspector William McCammon were at the back of the charges, Mr. McCammon lodging the complaint. Evidence was given by two khaki-clad detectives. Pte. Joseph Ferlito and Pte. Millina, who recently signed up with the 155th Battalion, Provincial Inspector Morrison, and the license inspector, William McCammon.

A. B. Cunningham and D. A. Givens acted as counsel in cases which were dismissed. C. K. Webster conducted the prosecution in each case.

#### Given A Chance.

The Magistrate reserved judgment in a charge of selling without a license against Mrs. Jane Hogan. The latter was also charged with keeping a disorderly house on Nelson street, and Mrs. Elizabeth Keenan and an aged man named Palmer were accused of being frequenters. The Magistrate decided to give the accused one more chance. Palmer claimed that he was a boarder at Mrs. Hogan's house, and the Magistrate advised him to get another boarding house. Sergt. Nesbitt and some of his men made the raid on the Nelson street house on Friday night.

### HAD RECORD SESSION, SEVENTEEN CHARGES.

#### Magistrate Farrell Sat On Bench Seven And Half Hours Friday.

There was a record session of the police court on Friday. Magistrate Farrell sat on the bench for seven and a half hours, and he had a variety of cases on the docket.

Court opened at 10.30 a.m. and sat until 1 p.m., resumed at 2 p.m., and it was 7 p.m. before the docket was cleaned off. This is the largest number of cases before the court in one day in several years, and the session was one of the longest ever held by Magistrate Farrell.

The morning session was given over entirely to the hearing of the charge against Lewis Martin, and in the afternoon several liquor cases and charges arising out of a raid made by the police on an alleged disorderly house occupied the attention of the magistrate.

He was twenty years old, was born in the Old Country, and before going overseas was employed at Davis tannery. He was a bright young man, and had a wide circle of friends. His father, Pte. George Hagon, is at the front with the 21st Battalion.

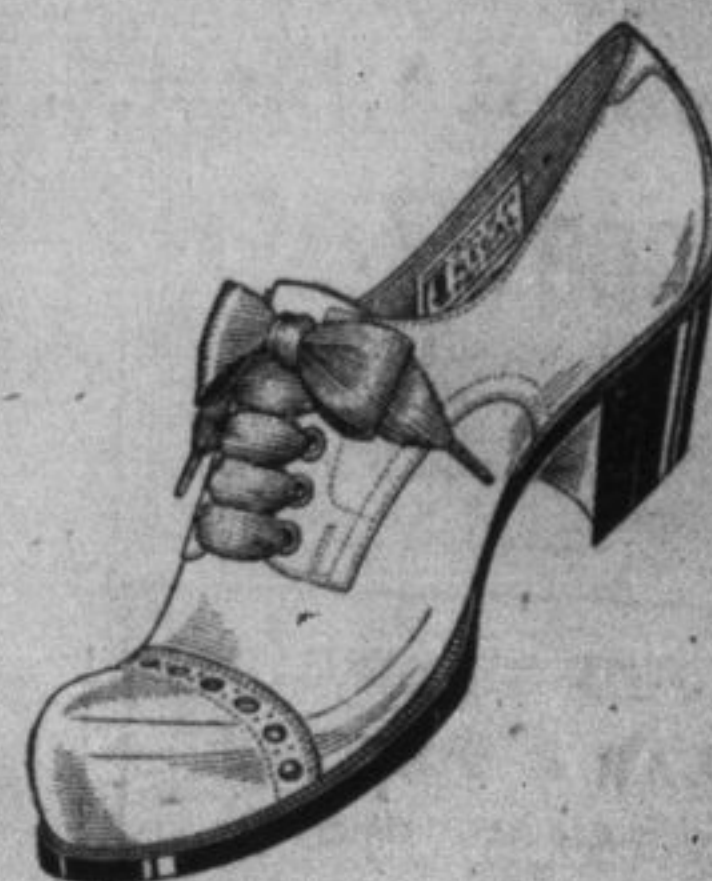
