### Tidings From All Over Told in a Pithy and Pointed Way.

German politicians admit that the execution of Captain Fryatt was "a mistake."

The International and British-American Nickel Companies are to erect refineries at once in Ontario.

Mrs. Alice Barrett Smith, of Hamilton, died as a result of taking bichloride of mercury in mistake for a headache tablet.

The Moor Line steamer Clodmoor reached Montreal from Genoa, damaged, but the victor of an encounter with a hostile submarine.

A new nickel steel process patented by two Canadians, one of whom is at the front, will, it is stated, be put in operation at Hamilton.

Joseph Southwell, two years old, was drowned at Whitley owing to falling into the water when exhausted by swimming and diving.

Hon. G. Howard Ferguson and Toronto Commissioners R. C. Harris and D. Chisholm have left for the district to make a survey of the situation.

Viscount Grey, the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, recently raised to the peerage by King George, took his seat in the House of Lords.

Paul Emile Chapleau was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary for having left for the Ottawa Valley as a government remount officer.

Rev. Dr. Joseph Font Newton, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, has been invited to fill the pulpit in the City Temple, London, as the successor of the Rev. E. J. Campbell.

Ferdinand J. Robidoux, French Canadian M.P. for Kent, N.B., is prominently mentioned as successor to Sir Pierre Landry on the Supreme Court bench of New Brunswick.
