### TAXI DRIVER WAS COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

### Charged With Doing Bodily W. D. BLACK RETURNS Harm to Corp. Gunn-Charge of Piquet.

Fred Stalker, a local taxi driver, was charged Monday morning before Justice of the Peace Bradshaw that he did, by furious driving and wilful neglect cause bodily harm to Corp. C. Gunn, of the 155th Battalion, sprainng his right ankle. After the evidence of a number of witnesses had been taken, Stalker was committed for trial, C. R. Webster conducted the prosecution, while D. A. Givens appeared for the defence. Corp. Gunn, when struck, was in charge of a piquet, some other members of which were knocked down, one berendered unconscious.


