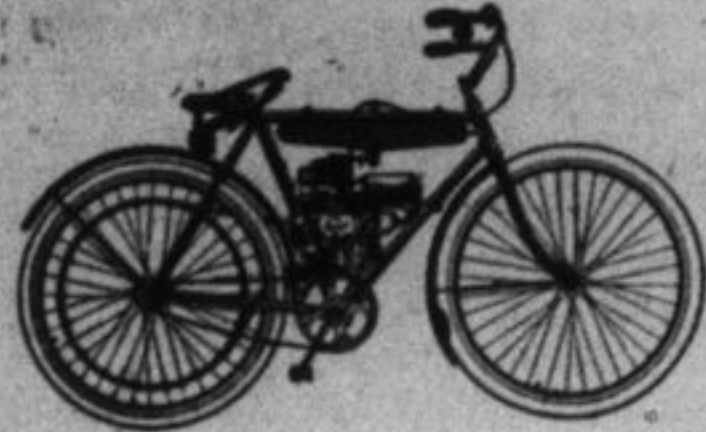

THE ATHLETICS TOOK IT

A SECOND BASEBALL GAME ON THE CRICKET FIELD.

Boyd, the new pitcher, showed up well, and had lots of speed, but as he did not know the players, he could not send over the right kind of ball at times. Derry was on the mound, and had good control of the ball nearly all the time. In the sixth he tired but came back strong in the seventh.

In the first, Batterton came in with the first run for the Vics. Two men were down and he got a one-bagger. Baker got another and he got over the platter. The Athletics got three in this inning. Spencer took first on an error of Laird, and Cummings also managed to get there. Cotman with some steam sent a home run hit away to the outfield, and brought both Spencer and Cummings in.

In the third inning the Athletics got two more. Cummings went to first on an error of Gillespie and Cotman sent the pill to centerfield for a single. Dehaney made first on an error of Baker and Cummings came home. In the sixth Hall came in when the ball was sent to second.

In the sixth the Victorias tied the score by getting five runs when Derry lost control. Nicholson, Laird, Batterton, Baker and Boyd came in. Belle replaced Kane in this inning. In the sixth the Athletics took the lead again when Spencer sent a home run hit past the outfield. In the seventh they got four more runs and got the game. Shea sent a nice three-bagger towards the right field, and came home on a one-bagger hit of Toland. Spencer and Cummings got another one bag. Dehaney took a bag hit and Toland; Spencer and Cummings then came in.

In the eighth Baker went to first on Cummings' error. Belle got one bag on a hit to centerfield. Burnett got another and sent the boys over the platter and then went home himself on a hit of Boyd. Athletics, however, got two in this inning. Shea coming in on a three base hit of Derry and Derry in on a single of Toland.
