Responsibility On Citizens And Returned Soldiers On Pay To Persuade Men To Enlist-National Registration Coming. The great revision of the recruit-

ing system for Canada is gradually becoming known and there seems to be more and more the feeling that in spite of political opposition there will be at least national registration. For some time back the Militia Department has been in a quandry as to which way to best secure the required number of recruits for the Canadian Expeditionary Force. sponsible person who will without remuneration fill out the blank forms that are necessary when a person enlists. The medical examination will be conducted under the present system of having the village practitioneer do the work at the current fee.

These men who sign up in this way will be granted immediately six weeks of farm furlough or two weeks more than is at present being granted. At the end of that time they will report for duty and receive pay for the six weeks in which they were engaged in farm work.

The returned soldiers will be used to stimulate the movement to the colors. In every county at a nonpolitical meeting a selection of two things will be made. One of these will be a location of the headquarters of the "County Company" to be raised in that district and the other will be the name of some returned soldier who would be eligible to take a commissioned rank.

The returned soldier will be appointed as a provisional lieutenant and will then organize the campaign for that county. Other returned soldiers will be put on the regular pay and "turned loose." They will act under orders not to press the men too hard, but to frankly and truthfully tell the story of their experience while in uniform. The returned soldiers and every recruit will then become a recruiting agent. The plan seems to be a good one in view of the fact that the expense in connection with it will be practically nothing. It will answer the question of an organized system that is lacking at the present and will move the responsibility of recruiting
