Called on Canadians.

Arising from the prosecution in the London (Eng.) Police Court of a French Dry Cleaning, gang of cocaine vendors who have been supplying the drug to soldiers, a fresh demand has been made for immediate legislation to cope with this latest form of plague. Owing to the fact that the development of this vice has only lately come to the public notice in England there is no legislation directly bearing on the evil except a provision in the Defence of the Realm Act, under which vendors of drugs to soldiers can be pun-

So unaccustomed are the Metropolitan police to dealing with these drug cases that they called on the Cana-dian military police to track down the offenders, and it was due to the efforts of Major Clifford, Regimental Sergt.-Major Dee and Sergt. Smith that the gang of vendors just prosecuted were entrapped. The London city police think that the prosecution will at least put a temporary check on the system of vending, which was spreading to large proportions. The selling has been chiefly by small foreign shop-keepers, who secured their supplies through one or two druggists, who have also been

The drug habit has been finding its victims among soldiers on leave after suffering from nerve strain at the front and soldier convalescents who are troubled from old wounds, and the police authorities are urging that immediate action should be taken to allow more severe penalties than three months' hard labor, such as given to the seven men who have just been prosecuted in the London just been prosecuted in the London Police Court.
