There was no excuse for his absence, as he has been before the Magistrate scores of times and he well knows the way. However if he will not come by invitation, force will be used to get him. He will be arrested for disobeying the summons. It does not pay to ignore the law.

**INDIGNATION IS EXPRESSED**

**OVER KINGSTON TREATING DOGS SO LEMENTLY.**

The Death of Allan Robinson Has Stirred the People—Kingston Needs an Effective Dog By-law.

There is great indignation throughout the city over the lack of protection given the people against the dog nuisance. The death of Allan Robinson of the Bell Telephone Company's staff, as the result of being bitten on the arm last Friday night while trying to stop a dog fight on King street west, has roused the people to demand that the City Council put into effect a by-law that will keep dogs off the streets. Other cities like Ottawa have solved the dog nuisance question, which the Whig on many occasions has brought forcibly to the attention of the city fathers, but up to the present time Kingston has no effective dog by-law.

C. H. Powell called at the Whig office Thursday morning to give his opinion of dogs running at large in Kingston, being prompted to do so owing to the death of Mr. Robinson, whose little children are deprived of a father through the failure of the civic body for years to put into effect a local law that will rid the streets of canines.

Mr. Powell stated that he is greatly bothered by dogs making attacks upon him while riding his motor cycle. He applied to the civic authorities for permission to carry a revolver for protection while on his machine, but was told it could not be given.

"I told them that I supposed I would have to wait until a dog tore my leg before I could do anything," said Mr. Powell, "and I was given to understand that I would have to do that. But I decided that I would not, and I go about on my motor cycle fully prepared for any dog that comes snapping at me. I think it is a crying shame that dogs are allowed to run at large as they are in Kingston."

Major Starr Left Thursday for Halifax Whence He Will Sail.

Major the Very Reverend Dean Starr received a telegram Wednesday night from the Militia Department, instructing him to report for overseas duty, and left Thursday noon for Halifax, from where he will sail for England.

Major Starr, who for a long time has been desirous of getting to the front, has importuned the Militia Department time and again to be allowed to go, and finally, his request was granted. So anxious was he to get to the firing line that he offered his services free. He has no idea yet of what particular duties he will be asked to perform.

Prof. Duckworth, of Trinity College, Toronto, will supply the Dean's work in St. George's during his absence.

**DEAN GOING OVERSEAS.**

So far this year there has been only one concrete walk laid in Kingston, and this is the one on Ontario street between Johnson and William streets, which was rendered necessary by the construction of a retaining wall. Probably not since Kingston became a city have there been so few new sidewalks laid in any year as in 1916. However the city is well covered and no one is suffering.
