KEPT POUNDING THE KEY

A PLUCKY RENFREW OPERATOR STUCK TO HIS POST.

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Bates, Renfrew, Not Dead, But Survived a Terrible Ordeal in the North Country Fire.

Renfrew, Aug. 12.—To have stuck at his post in a burning station at Matheson, pounding a telegraph key, with his wife beside him, and not knowing what minute the burning freight shed, containing dynamite, would blow them into eternity, was the truly terrible ordeal through which a Renfrew man, G. H. Bates, and his wife came through in the north country holocaust.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Bates were officially reported dead, but Mr. Bates is now in Renfrew, recovering from a nerve-shattering experience while, Mr. Bates is still in Matheson on the job for the T. N. O.

They both stayed right in the station, where Mr. Bates kept the line open until the fire destroyed it somewhere. They with many other refugees, they boarded a freight and ran the gauntlet of flame. Three cars took fire in getting out of the burned area, but the inhabitants fought the flames as best they could until the engine driver could temporarily reach a place of safety when the fire in the cars was extinguished. Then the freight rolled into Englehart, where after a few hours rest, Mr. Bates again returned to Matheson, or as near as he could get, for the line in the meantime had been destroyed, the ties being burned and the rails twisted.

Their narrowest escape was in leaving the burning station when they did, for a few minutes after the freight shed containing the dynamite blew up. In Matheson, alone, over 125 people perished.

As Mrs. Bates reported dead, and as she does not know the present address of her father, S. T. Storey, who formerly resided at Sudbury, she is making known her safety and contradicting the report of her death through the medium of the press.

OBITUARY

The Late George Tidman.

In the Hotel Dieu on Friday afternoon passed away after an illness of a week's duration. The deceased was removed to the Hotel Dieu on Wednesday last as his condition was recognized as serious.

The late Mr. Tidman was born in England sixty-four years ago and came to this country with his family from London eleven years ago. He resided at 101 York street and has been a worker for the Canadian Locomotive Company since his arrival. The deceased has been a faithful worker in Salvation Army circles for a quarter of a century. Since coming to the city the late Mr. Tidman and his family took an active interest in army circles here, and was a regular attendant at the various meetings.

Besides his sorrowing widow the deceased is survived by eight children: Leon, husband in the 145th Battalion at Valcartier Camp; Rogivald, Oliver, Victor, Horace, Arthur, Amey and Hilda at home.

FIGHT WITH AEROPLANES. War Office Sends Anti-Aircraft Gun To Canadian National

An anti-aircraft gun, such as is now mounted all over England and on the battlefields in France, Belgium and elsewhere, is being sent over by the British War Office for use at the Canadian National Exhibition, and will be utilized for the purpose of making the fights between the invading aeroplanes and the land forces stationed on Exhibition shore more realistic, the battles being staged under conditions similar to those existing in Great Britain and the war zone. The Admiralty has also been asked to approve the shipment to Toronto of a 20-foot model of the Hercules, a first-class battleship built in 1911, and at present one of the most powerful in the British Navy. An effort was made to secure a submarine for exhibition on the waterfront, but the Admiralty protested on the ground that every one now available is required for war purposes. Negotiations have since been opened with the United States Government for the loan of one, but so far no definite answer has been received.
