TWO TONS OF POTATOES DAILY

This is Consumption at Barriefield Camp—800 Pounds of Vegetables

The soldiers at Barriefield sume 800 pounds of vegetables every day. These are purchased by the Army Service Corps through a contractor, or directly, if the contractor "falls down on the job" either in quantity or quality as determined by a Ration Board held every day. At present, owing to the scarcity of vegetables, the contractors, the Har-ris Abbatoir Co., have had difficulty n filling the order.

The soldiers use two or three tons of potatoes daily, the price being less than two cents a pound although the current market price is higher.
