## BRITISH PUSH FURTHER AHEAD

They Score Advances West And Southwest of Guillemont.

### ALSO CAPTURED 300 YARDS

OF GERMAN TRENCH WEST OF FOUREAUX WOOD.

The Gain Here Advanced the British Position 300 Yards—British Drive Forward in Conjunction With French.

(Special to the Whig.) London, Aug. 17.—Driving forward in conjunction with the French, the British not only scored advances west and southwest of Guillemont last night, but also captured 300 yards of a German trench west of Fourceaux Wood. Gen. Haig reported this afternoon. The gain in this region advanced the British front 300 yards from their previous position. East of Mouquet Farm (northwest of Pozieres) British machine guns stopped a German attack.

Lieut. Ben. Franklin, 146th Battalion, Valcartier Camp, is spending a few days leave in town.

Major G. L. Goodwin, Imperial Munitions Board, Ottawa, is in the city.

Lieut.-Col. H. R. Wilson, Major J. Hamilton and Capt. Palmer, of the Camp Headquarters, are in Trenton, as a board to enquire into the circumstances surrounding a fire in the Armouries at that place.

There are now ninety-two men in the Special Service Battalion. The officers now are: Capt. Thorne, in command and Lieut. Potts, adjutant, and Lieut. Bissonette, paymaster and quartermaster.

Lieut. P. J. Browne has been detailed to take command of the Base Company, 15th Battalion, vice Lieut. H. R. Kincaid, who has been ordered to go overseas.

The weeding out of medically unfit, an inevitable proceeding in practically every unit raised for overseas service, is being slowly carried on among the members of the 156th Leeds and Grenville Battalion stationed here. Yesterday's battalion orders include the names of seven men of the unit who have been struck off the strength of the 156th through being medically unfit for further service. These men have been granted an honorable discharge from the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

As against this loss of seven men through medical unfitness, the battalion orders report the enlistment of one recruit. Strengthening efforts are being made by recruiting parties stationed at different points in the united counties to bring the units up to strength at the earliest possible moment, but the results of their exertions are not as satisfactory as they might be. Major G. W. Elliott and Lieut. Oakes were in Kemptonville on recruiting duty recently.

Word comes from Valcartier camp that the 146th Battalion baseball team has defeated every other diamond organization down there. The other day "Jack" Gozard's Engineers thought they could trounce the 146th nine, but "Bike" Young's artists put it all over them.

### QUASHED KINGSTON LIQUOR CONVICTION

Against W. Teepel, Patrick Burns and W. McIlraith Held to Be Agents.

A special from Toronto to the Whig says: "Holding that the defendants acted as messengers or agents, Justice Masten to-day quashed the conviction and rescinded the fine of three hundred dollars each imposed at Kingston against W. Teepel, Patrick Burns and William McIlraith for selling liquor without a license." The three men above mentioned were given money by detectives in military uniform to buy liquor for them. The men did so, but made no profit. They merely were doing an errand like a messenger, the appeal judge decides.

Reported Injured. A regrettable report coming from Ottawa, states that Major W. L. Grant, of Kingston who went overseas with the 59th Battalion, was thrown from his horse in France and seriously injured. No report was received in Kingston of the affair and the news came as a great shock to his many friends here. Major Grant, who is a son of the late Principal Grant, was a professor at Queen's University before going overseas. The report says Prof. Grant had several ribs broken and his head cut.

Canadian Casualties. Died of wounds—H. J. Williams, Campbellford. Wounded—E. E. Bell, Brockville; Lieut. D. F. Dewar, Pembroke.

A treaty between Great Britain and the United States for protection of insect destroying birds on both sides of the Canadian boundary was signed at the State Department, Washington, on Wednesday by Secretary Lansing and Ambassador Spring-Rice.

The British registration measure will not be finally dealt with until the autumn.
