The Perfect Bait.

It is caseln brown sugar and water mixed in equal parts. This mixture must be left to stand for twenty-four hours or so before a fly will take much notice of it.

This bait, which no doubt will soon be taken up by every public medical authority costs very little to make, and is quite harmless.

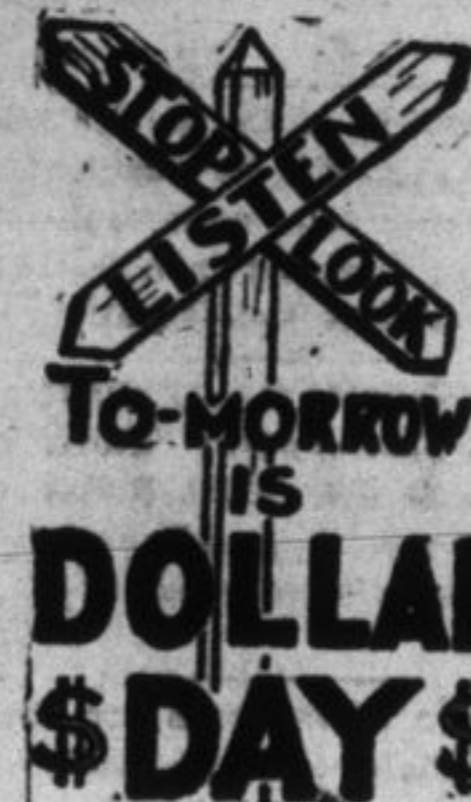
