TORONTO ELECTS HARTLEY DEWART

Liberal Candidate Was Victorious in Monday's Bye-Election.

HIS MAJORITY WAS 643

WINNER CALLS RESULT VICTORY FOR PROGRESSIVES.

Tory Toronto Deals a Heavy Blow at the Sleepers in Queen's Park—Great Rejoicing by the Liberal Voters.

Toronto, Aug. 22.—By the substantial majority of 643 Hartley Dewart, K.C., Liberal, defeated James A. Norris, Conservative, in yesterday's bye-election in South-west Toronto.

Mr. Dewart is the first Liberal elected to represent a Toronto seat in the legislature in twenty-six years.

The immense turnover, coming as it does from the largest and most cosmopolitan riding in "Tory Toronto," is regarded as a crushing blow to the Hearst Administration.

Hon. G. Howard Ferguson undertook to handle the whole platform campaign, and sought to his assistance the Attorney-General, Hon. B. Lucas, and the Provincial Treasurer, Hon. T. W. McGarry.

There were no two opinions on the streets last night as to the significance of the result. "The Hearst Government is gone," said a former president of the Conservative Association.

Mr. Dewart's Campaign. Hartley Dewart, the successful candidate, entered the contest but eight days ago.

At his first meeting Mr. Dewart declared himself to be the people's candidate.

London, Aug. 22.—Wounded Canadian officers convalescing are permitted, if they so desire, to visit the British fleet and spend one week at sea to assist in recuperating.

HUN BATTLESHIP LKELY SUNK

British submarine E-23 made a successful attack on a German battleship on Saturday the Admiralty announced this morning.

She was first attacked by the submarine and damaged. Five destroyers came to her rescue.

The battleships of the Nassau class displace 18,602 tons each and were built about nine years ago.

A TALE FROM BERLIN. Berlin, Aug. 22.—The Bulgarian and German forces have defeated the Allied troops on both wings in the Balkans, capturing positions from both Serbians and French.

SIX ALLIES FIGHT TOGETHER

Russian Troops Have Been Landed at Salonika For Service.

FOLLOW THE ITALIANS

AND ALL WILL BE IN ACTION VERY SHORTLY

GERMAN MORALE IS WEAKENED

By the Intensive Efforts of the British and French.

TEUTONS HAVE LOST POWER

OF EFFECTIVE COUNTER-ATTACKS THEY FORMERLY HAD

Air Free of Their Aeroplanes, and Allies' Movements Are Well Hidden—New Offensive May Open on Alsace Border.

New York, Aug. 22.—The Tribune's London correspondent cables as follows: It is evident that the recent British and French intensive efforts have weakened the German morale and made possible these great gains, which are eating the heart out of the German third line.

The principle of the counter-attack is one of the first taught in the German military text books. Though earlier in the Somme offensive they were ready to throw a whole army corps for the recapture of some local position, now they seem unable to scratch up a brigade within the space of 24 hours.

VALUABLE GROUND GAINED.

In the present circumstances this is the more noteworthy because the ground the British have just gained along the watershed from Pozieres toward Peronne is extremely valuable.

The added fact that German aeroplanes now scarce dare show themselves completes the German acquiescence in the British gains, and is perhaps the first striking proof of the decay of their strength.

No better criterion of the relative condition of the French and German armies has yet appeared than the fact that the French can attack with fury after six months warfare at Verdun, while the Germans are completely thrown on the defensive after seven weeks of the Franco-British effort on the Somme.

TURKS RETIRING.

Have Given Up Job of Attacking British at Suez.

London, Aug. 22.—There are indications that the Turkish Army on Sinal Peninsula is retreating toward its base, says an exchange telegraph despatch from Cairo.
