The Dominion and Ontario Governments have each subscribed One Hundred Thousand Dollars, and the City of Toronto Fifty Thousand. It is estimated that at least Four Hundred Thousand Dollars is needed to effectively relieve the situation, which is very serious. Citizens are urged not to make contributions through other than the Toronto central organization, in order that duplication and waste may be avoided.
