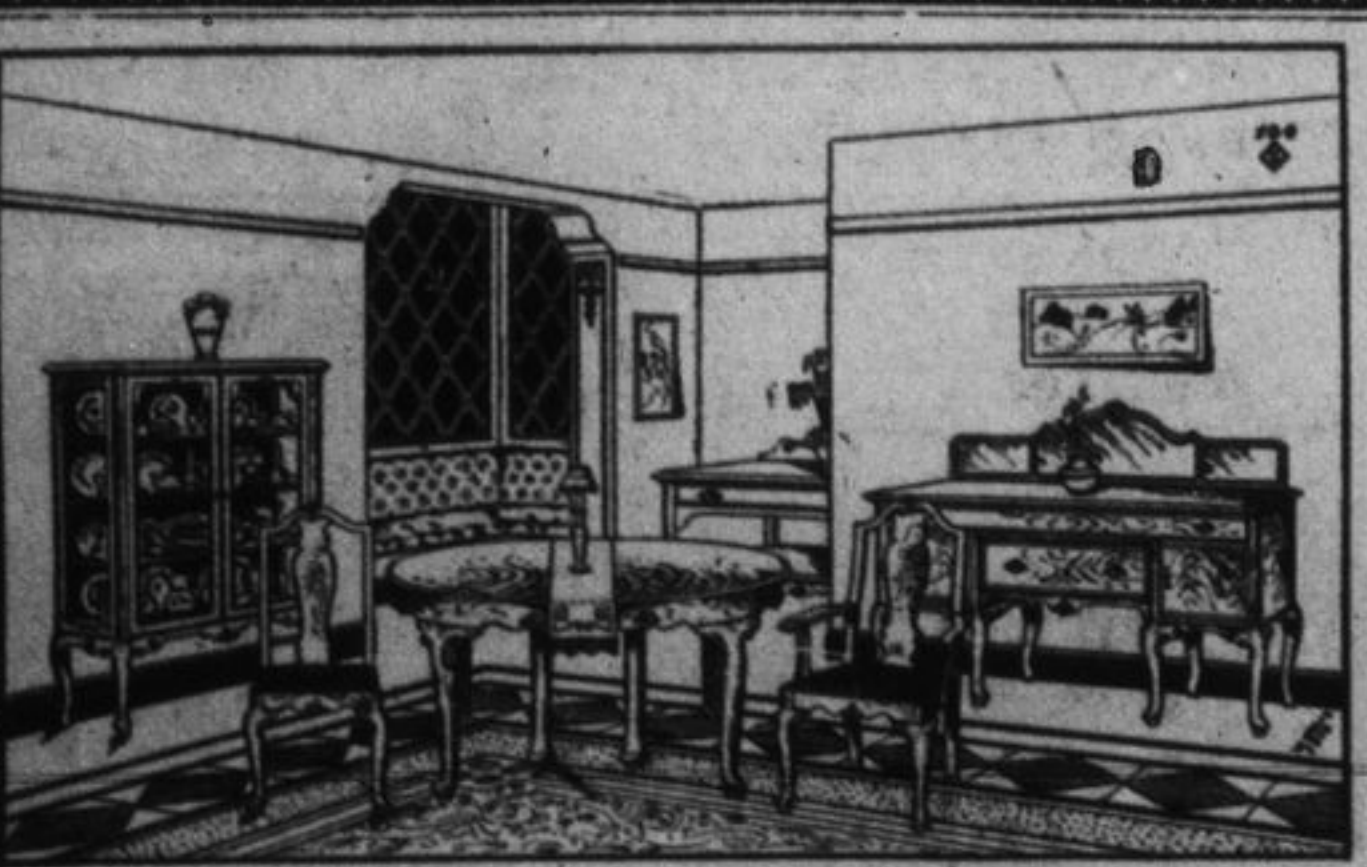

OBJECTED TO HANDCUFFS WENT DOWN EIGHT TIMES

WHAT ONE OF ESCAPED GERMAN TOLD WHIG REPORTER

When in Fort Henry — He Hated Canada For So Treating Him — Was Here on Pleasure Trip When Arrested.

One of the prisoners of war who escaped from Fort Henry once used the expression that follows to a Whig representative: "My only hatred of things Canadian is the fact that when I was arrested they put handcuffs on me." The speaker was a tall well-built intelligent looking young man who wore a jaunty little moustache and had his hair closely cropped. When seen he wore a suit of white duck and seemed to be thoroughly enjoying his life at Fort Henry. The case of being hand-cuffed occurred in Toronto. He was travelling in Canada when the war broke out and immediately reported himself as an alien enemy to the authorities. He was ordered to report regularly and given the promise that nothing would be done. He showed credentials as being the junior member of a wealthy manufacturing firm in western Germany, being in the tile business. His trip to America was purely an educational one, so he said. He learned English at his college and wished to know the country where so much of his firm's business was transacted. After reporting to the Toronto police at the time and making a practice of living the quiet life until authority could be received to let him out of the country, he strenuously objected to the indignity of having to wear hand-cuffs while under arrest.

FORMER KINGSTONIAN HAD NARROW ESCAPE FROM DROWNING

Adjutant Charles A. Gunn of Gloucester, Mass., Oves His Life to the Fact That He Kept His Head—He Tells of His Experience.

Adjutant Charles A. Gunn, of the Salvation Army, Gloucester, Mass., and a former well-known Kingstonian had a very narrow escape from drowning recently. The Times of Gloucester, has an account of the mishap, and states that Adjutant Gunn was not able to swim very well, but when he sank for the last time, he refused to lose his head, kept his mouth closed, and this helped in the rescue. Adjutant Gunn takes no stock in the saying that when one sinks for the third time, he is finished. In all he sank eight times. The former Kingstonian gives an interesting account of his experiences. He said: "I am able to swim but a very little. When the under-... caught me it was too strong for me and I was pulled to the bottom. Three things saved me. I kept my head, I kept my mouth closed and I dog-paddled every time I touched bottom. Every time I came up to the surface I asked Mr. Hotchkiss what he was going to do for me. At least he discovered a loose plank and threw it. While I was going down for about the fifth time, I thought that I would lose out, and I wondered if they would get the lungmotor from the police station to me in time. I allowed myself a half hour in the water with still a good chance of being revived. I did not lose my head and that is what saved me."

JUST THIRTEEN FIREMEN

TWO MORE DROP OUT AFTER SHORT TIME ON THE JOB

Chief Armstrong Finds That It Is No Snap Running a Department Without Firemen—Higher Wages at Other Work Take Away Men.

Wanted—Men for the Kingston Fire Department who will stay on the job.

Running a Fire Department without firemen is no easy matter. If you don't believe this, just ask Fire Chief Armstrong for he has every reason to know. Of course as long as there are no fires it does not matter whether there is a full staff or not, but there is always a chance of a big fire breaking out and it is just this chance that keeps the Chief uneasy.

The Chief signed up two new men this month. One started in on August 14th, and the other on August 22nd. The first man stayed just a little over a week while the other remained on the job one day.

Firefighting at \$1.60 per day (of twenty-four hours) does not appeal to the young men when they can make more money elsewhere. For instance at the Locomotive Works, where men are making big pay working on munitions. One of the firemen who has resigned is now working on munitions at the Locomotive Works.

As a result of the two men jumping their job, the staff is again reduced to thirteen, which is certainly an unlucky number, and unless the staff is soon strengthened the other firemen will feel that something is sure to happen.

TWO OLD-TIME VESSELS

Rideau King and Queen May Be Sold At Auction.

A rumor has been going the rounds to the effect that the steamers Rideau King and the Rideau Queen, which have been running on the Rideau River for many years, had been sold to a large contractor, and that they would be overhauled in Kingston and placed into commission, but as far as the Whig has been able to ascertain, the vessels have not been sold.

The Rideau Queen has been fitted out so as to go into business as a freighter. The Rideau King has been raised and the two boats may be sold at auction, or taken to Belleville. Both vessels have been leaking, and would need to undergo extensive repairs.

WATER CARNIVAL STAGED

AT BARRIEFIELD CAMP BY THE DEPOT BATTERIES.

The 73rd Battery Carried Off Most of the Prizes, Which Were Presented to the Winners by Lieut. Col. Arnold.

Swimming, diving, log rolling and many other events featured the programme of the water carnival staged by the depot batteries at Barriefield Camp, Friday afternoon. It was the first event of its kind to be put on, and due to the efforts of Captain Brierson, Lieut. Williams, Sergt. Major Ross, it was a big success. The weather was a trifle cool, but despite this fact there was a large attendance of ladies and friends of the athletes competing. Lieut. Colonel Arnold, who recently returned from Petawawa, was among those present, and at the conclusion of the afternoon's sport he presented the prizes to the various winners. Major Brierson and all the officers of the various batteries were also on hand to assist with the arrangements.

The 73rd Battery was again well represented in the different events, and as usual they carried off the bulk of the prizes. The first event called for the under water swim. Two heats were necessary owing to the large entry. In the final heat Taylor of the 72nd Battery was first, with Carson second and Cole third. The next event was the neat dive. Stroud, of the 73rd, was first and Art Stroud, the diminutive all-round athlete of the same battery, was second. The twenty-five yard back swim was another big event. This also went to Stroud, with Sergt. Taber second. Cole finished a good third. Taber swam a great race, and was only beaten out by inches.

Only four crews entered the filling contest, which was won by Sergt. Taber and Corp. Clarke, a crew from the 73rd Battery. They easily disposed of a crew from the ammunition column and one from the 74th Battery. All kind of fun was furnished in the greasy pole competition. Of the fifteen starters only five were able to reach the flag. These drew for the prize, and Carson from the 72nd drew the lucky number.

The twenty-five yard speed event was won by McBride, of the 74th Battery, who covered the distance in good time. Clayton, of the 72nd Battery, was second, and Sergt. Taber third.

Ingram, of the 73rd, won the log-rolling contest; Deason, of the 74th, second; and Ray Rice, of the 73rd, was third.

One of the best events of all was the 100 yard swim. About five started, and it was a great fight all the way. LaHaise, a 73rd man, finished first, with Currie of the same battery second. The winner collapsed at the finish, but was able to move about a few minutes later.
