THEY HID UNDERGROUND.

Scheme of the Germans Who Escaped is Discovered.

Major P. G. C. Campbell, commandant of Fort Henry, has not yet been able to locate the two prisoners of war who got away on Wednesday afternoon. It has been since learned that they hid in their little vegetable garden until able to escape after nightfall. The scheme was one of the cleverest imaginable.

The two escaped men were German officers, and with others were on parole up to a short time ago. As "gentlemen" they had promised not to try and escape if allowed to take exercise outside of the walls. The two, however, dug trenches in their garden that corresponded to shallow graves. On Wednesday afternoon the two had gradually and quietly covered themselves over and were hidden from view of the guards. Their escape was comparatively easy. There is still reason to believe that they are in Canada.

On Friday afternoon Major P. G. C. Campbell was informed by a telephone message, alleged to come from Clayton, that the two Germans had arrived safely, but little faith is put in this message.

The infantrymen of the camp thoroughly scoured all the country for miles around on Friday afternoon and returned about 6 p.m., after a most satisfactory scheme of field manoeuvres, which was used to try and locate the missing Germans.

CHARGED WITH VAGRANCY.

But More Serious Charges May Be Preferred Against Fred Cain.

A warrant has been taken out before Lieut.-Col. Hunter, charging one Fred Cain with vagrancy, and efforts are being made to locate him. The last heard of him was when he hired a boat at a local livery to go to Seeley Bay. He has a young wife, who recently gave birth to a child, and it is alleged that he has not been treating her properly. Recently they were camping out at Kingston Mills. More serious charges may be preferred against Cain when he is apprehended.

GIVEN MILITARY CROSS.

Major William Rhoades was Formerly at Royal Military College. Information has been received in the city to the effect that Major William Rhoades who was at one time at the Royal Military College, has been awarded the military cross. He is serving with the 5th Mounted Rifles, and collected and transmitted to headquarters information of the movements of the enemy under very heavy fire. He was wounded, and had a very close call, but is getting along nicely. Major Rhoades was formerly riding master at the Royal Military College.
