## COMRADES RAISED CROSS ANOTHER SPEEDER CAUGHT

### POPULAR SOLDIER MEETS HERO'S DEATH.

Letter From Chaplain of 18th Battalion Refers Feeling to the Death of Pte. J. Earle Gallagher, of Portland, Ont.  
Albert Gallagher, Portland, Ont., has received the following letter from H. Dobson, Company E., chaplain of the 18th Battalion, relating to the death of Mr. Gallagher's nephew, Pte. Earle Gallagher, who was killed in action on July 24th.  
Pte. Gallagher, before taking up his short military life, says the Brockville Times, was a great favorite with the residents of Harlem and Portland, where by his genial disposition he made many friends, and his death is deeply regretted by all. That he was well liked by his comrades in arms is shown by the letter which Mr. Gallagher has just received, and which reads in part as follows:

4th Brigade, 2nd Division, Canadian I. P. Forces, August 11, 1916.  
A. Gallagher, Portland, Ontario.

Dear Sir—It is with deep regret that I write you of the death of your nephew, Pte. J. E. Gallagher, 455898, 18th Battalion. He was killed instantly, on the evening of the 24th of July. I buried him the following day in the beautiful military cemetery at Riouwood. It may be a comfort for you to know that your dear boy was a favorite with all in his platoon, and was proving himself a good soldier, under shell and rifle fire. We all deeply regret his falling asleep—he has done his duty to his country and King and to God, and now God has given him his own reward.

May the all-loving Father bless you and yours in your sorrow.

A. J. Pettigrew Resigns From His Position in Engineer's Office.  
A. J. Pettigrew, clerk in the office of City Engineer McClelland, has resigned, to accept a position in the office of James Richardson & Sons. For nine years Mr. Pettigrew has been in the service of the city. For three years with the City Engineer. He proved himself a most capable official, and was well liked and popular with everyone at the city buildings. The best wishes of his many friends, both at the City Buildings and throughout the city, will go with him in his new position. Mr. Pettigrew will serve as an assistant accountant with James Richardson & Sons. He covers his connection with the City Engineer's office to-day, and will take up his new position on Friday. His successor has not yet been appointed.

## Here For the Winter.

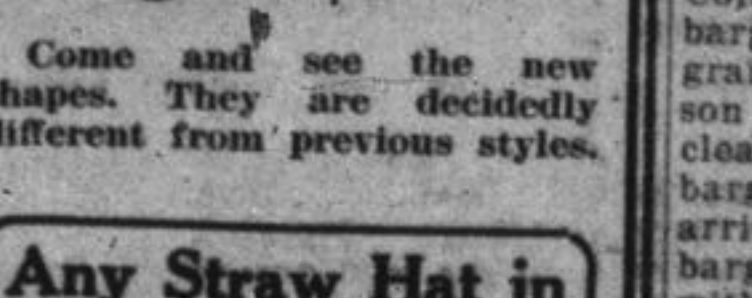
