### NEWS FROM THE DISTRICT

### NEW BISHOP NAMED FOR PEMBROKE DIOCESE

#### Bishop Ryan Succeeds the Late Bishop Lorrain, Who Died Last December.

Pembroke, Sept. 1.—Bishop Ryan, auxiliary bishop of Pembroke and Bishop of Pazo, who has been administrator of the Roman Catholic diocese here, since the death of Bishop Lorrain last December, has received the appointment to the vacant see. News of the choice of Bishop Ryan, who is a most popular one among all classes of the people was received from the apostolic delegate at Ottawa last night, who announced receipt of the appointment from Rome.

The new bishop of Pembroke was born in Ireland in 1864 and came to Pembroke with his parents when a child. He received his early education here and took his theological course at Ottawa University and the Grand Seminary in Montreal, being ordained to the priesthood in December, 1887. From that time to 1891 he was secretary to the late Bishop Lorrain, for the next two years parish priest at Mount St. Patrick and then parish priest at Renfrew until May 1912, when he was named titular Bishop of Pazo, and auxiliary of Pembroke. His consecration to the bishopric took place July 25, 1912, in Pembroke.

### BRITAIN'S RED TAPE HAMPER HER TRADE

#### Elaborate Precautions and System Delay Exports—New Department Criticized.

London, Sept. 1.—The restrictions imposed upon British exports by red tape methods of the War Trade Department are exciting indignation among British-Canadian traders here. The Morning Post editorial says: "Even those who export to the British Empire are being treated as if they or their customers were potential enemies. Fearing re-export back to the enemy, an elaborate system of forms is delaying and exasperating British exporters." The Post urges: "It would be much better to trust recognized British merchants and come down heavily upon delinquents. Offenders will not be caught by forms by customs officers or detectives. Exporters are helping to win the war if they are only allowed."

### JAPS WERE AGGRESSORS.

#### So Says Chinese Premier, Discussing Recent Clash.

Peking, Sept. 1.—At a secret session of Parliament yesterday Premier Tuan Chi-Jui, replying to enquiries about the recent clash between Chinese and Japanese troops at Cheng Chiatun, in Eastern Mongolia, said the Japanese were the aggressors and fired the first shots. He was doing his best to maintain the dignity of China in settling the difficulty.

### AUSTRIAN SPY TO BE SHOT.

#### Was Under Pay to Blow up Italian Munition Plants.

Rome, Sept. 1.—An Austrian spy named Larese was to-day sentenced to be shot by a military court at Ancona, and four other spies were sentenced to life imprisonment. All were engaged in plots to blow up munition plants in Italy. Larese confessed that he was being paid by the Austrian general staff. Larese was arrested while placing bombs in the gun works at Terni. The long cylindrical bombs that he carried were screwed together to resemble a walking stick.

### THE WILSON WALTZ.

#### President Has Been Dancing It For Four Years.

New York, Sept. 1.—The "Wilson Waltz" is quite the latest thing in realms terpsichorean, according to Mrs. Robert Baker, of the National Women's party.

### GERMANY'S FOOD SUPPLY.

#### Will Not Interfere With the Military Situation.

Berlin, Sept. 1.—The outlook for the food supply and the general economic situation in Germany are highly satisfactory at the present, and there are no indications that these considerations will assume at any time an aspect which will influence the military plans and operations of the empire, says Dr. Karl Helfferich, Secretary of the Interior.

### FALL SESSION UNLIKELY

#### Parliament Not To Be Summoned Until Next Year.

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—There is to be no fall session of Parliament this year. Such at least is the present intention, and it will be carried out unless something unforeseen arises to necessitate the calling of the House. Parliament will likely be summoned to meet soon after the new year.

### YUKON STAYS "WET."

#### Prohibition Apparently Defeated in Wednesday's Voting.

Vancouver, Sept. 1.—Scanty information so far available is to the effect that prohibition was defeated in the Yukon Wednesday by a majority of fifty, with polling places aggregating 200 votes still to be heard from.

There is consternation in Sofia, capital of Bulgaria, over the approach of Russian troops through the Dobruja.

### THE VATICAN WANTS NO OPPRESSION

**Just and Durable Peace, Pope Benedict's Wish—to Continue Neutral.**

Paris, Sept. 1.—Speaking on behalf of Pope Benedict, Cardinal Gasparri, interviewed by a special correspondent of The Journal said: "The Pope desires a just and durable peace, which will oppress no peoples and take consideration of their aspirations. Meanwhile the Holy See maintains an attitude of strict impartiality, with a particular benevolence towards the suffering Catholic countries, France, Poland and Belgium." "We have been reproached for our attitude toward certain methods of waging war, but could the Pope pass sentence upon particular cases? Such accusations are made by all sides.

"Our policy is to hold aloof in order to help any nation. The Pope mentions France in his prayers. He seeks the peace which has merited the fine title of the eldest daughter of the church."

Regarding the possibilities of France's resumption of diplomatic relations with the Vatican, Cardinal Gasparri said: "We think it is possible, and we would be delighted. All depends upon the French Government. It will not forget the patriotism of her priests under fire, and I do not believe that it will desire religious persecution after the war."

### EARLY MORNING BLAZE DESTROYS LYN BARN

#### Frank Bolin Sustains Heavy Loss in Fire in Which Cattle and Poultry Were Killed.

Brockville, Sept. 1.—On Wednesday a disastrous conflagration occurred on the farm of Frank Bolin on the 3rd concession of Elizabethtown, north east of Lyn station. How the fire originated is a mystery, but it is thought to have been caused by sparks from a furnace. When the owner and his family retired there were no signs of any disaster. The building was one of the finest in the township. It was 100 feet long by 50 feet wide and is totally destroyed. The loss of the main structure in itself would be a heavy one, but in addition a good sized hen house and a pig pen were burned. The contents of the barn were also lost together with 3 horses, 4 pigs and 100 hens. In the barn were 75 tons of this season's hay, 500 bushels of threshed grain and a quantity of unthreshed as well. The loss is a heavy one.

### A SYDENHAM BRIDE

#### Wedding Ceremony Took Place at Maynard on 29th.

Sydenham, Aug. 31.—The marriage of Lulu Dales, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Robinson to Levk Cranston, of Sydenham, was solemnized by the Rev. Richard Street at the home of the bride's parents, Maynard, on Tuesday, August 29th, at 10 a.m. in the presence of only a few friends.

The bride, who entered the drawing room with her father, looked exceedingly well in a gown of cream velvet and wore a corsage bouquet of sweet peas. She was unattended throughout the service. After a dainty luncheon, served in the spacious dining-room, decorated with pink and white asters, Mr. and Mrs. Cranston left by motor for the groom's home, the green travelling in a military suit of green broadcloth and black velvet hat.

#### Warning Issued to Young Men Who Threw a Bottle at a Pedestrian.

Lindsay, Sept. 1.—Saturday night two men while driving home through the East Ward addressed a few remarks to a lady who was walking on the street. Constable Parkes was notified, and wishes to warn the parties that if they persist in such actions again that the excuse of being under the influence of liquor will not protect them.

Rockport, Sept. 1.—Wilson T. Gove and Miss Florence Root, two of Alexandria Bay's popular young people, were quietly married on Monday evening at the Methodist Episcopal parsonage, Rev. W. W. McCracken, pastor, officiating. The couple was attended by Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Root, brother and sister-in-law of the bride.
