THE IMPROVED RUSSIANS
EFFICIENCY AND MORALE IN-
CREASED FIFTY PER CENT.

Their Trenches Are As Good, If Not
Better, Than Those of the Teutons.
London, Sept. 2.—A Times corre-
spondent, in a despatch from Rovno
dealing with the morale of the Rus-
sian troops, says: "The recent fight-
ing has shown that German shells and
German numbers could not blast or
bayonet the Russians out of their po-
sitions this year, when they had
something with which to shoot, and
could at last listen to the music of
their own shells bursting over the
Teuton lines.

PHENOMENAL RISE
IN CUSTOMS INCOME
Receipts for the Month of Au-
gust Show Increase of
\$3,610,000.

Ottawa, Sept. 2.—A further pheno-
menal rise in customs indicating the
maintenance of this year's remark-
able trade increases is shown in the
monthly statement issued to-day, by
Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Customs.
The August revenue from cus-
toms reached a total of \$11,941,000
as compared with \$8,330,000, an in-
crease of \$3,610,000.

CROWN MUST PROVE
HUSBAND IS ALIVE
Woman Charged With Bigamy
Discharged at Guelph—
Married Two Soldiers.

Guelph, Sept. 2.—A nice legal point
came up in the police court this
morning before Magistrate Watt in
the case of a charge of bigamy pre-
ferred against Alice Hogz, of this
city. The evidence submitted went
to prove that on March 17, 1915,
she was married in St. James'
church to John George Wilson, a
member of the 34th Battalion. When
this unit went overseas Alice became
infatuated with a little Frenchman
named Arthur Chartrand, a former
member of the 153rd Battalion. She
was arrested two weeks ago, and was
given her preliminary hearing this
morning.
Col. Macdonald, county crown at-
torney, after having proved the two
marriages, wanted committed for
trial, but Mr. C. L. Dunbar, her counsel,
objected. He argued that the
law said the Crown must prove that
the first husband was alive when the
second marriage ceremony was per-
formed. This the Crown could not
do. Col. Macdonald, in conference
with the magistrate in his interpre-
tation of the law, holding that recog-
nition must be taken of the presump-
tion of the continuity of life, in view
of the fact that no proof exists of
the death of George Wilson. He
held that Alice Hogz had the right to
contract the second marriage one
year after her marriage to her first
husband, unless she had a reasonable
belief in the previous death of her
first husband. Such presumption of
the continuity of life would not ter-
minate for seven years.
The magistrate, however, took the
same view of the case as did Mr.
Dunbar, and declined to commit the
defendant for trial. She was dis-
charged.

GRAIN FROM RUSSIA
SOON AVAILABLE
Russia Can Easily Spare 500,-
000,000 Bushels of Wheat
Alone.

London, Sept. 2.—It is almost cer-
tain that Russian grain will be avail-
able in large quantities before the
end of the season. The indication
is that European and Asiatic Russia
will secure a harvest of 90,000,000
quarters (720,000,000 bushels),
which is well above the average of
the last ten years. It is also indi-
cated that there is a large reserve
remaining in Russia from the two
previous crops, and a balance from
the crop of 1913.

It is safe to say that Russia can
spare 70,000,000 quarters (560,-
000,000 bushels) of wheat alone,
without counting maize, barley and
oats.
Once this is available, North Am-
erica will no longer be able to dic-
tate terms. Of course, the question
of shipping will be a difficultly until
the end of the war, but even if the
Turks are not compelled to open the
Dardanelles grain could be shipped
from Salonika once the Allies drive
the Teutons from North-eastern Ser-
bia and the western half of Bul-
garia.

DEATH IS DECREED
IF HIRE REJECTED
Carranza Orders That Work-
men Who Refuse Thirty
Cents a Day be Tried.

El Paso, Texas, Sept. 2.—Decreases
have been issued in many of the Cen-
tral and Southern Mexican States by
the Carranza government announcing
that workmen and laborers who
refuse to continue work at ten pesos
a day (thirty cents gold) will be
tried and if found guilty will be
promptly put to death. This is the
information brought to the border
by several Americans. The arrivals
say that already several people have
been shot because of their refusal
to work under the existing condi-
tions.
The workmen and laborers in many
of the sections of the country have
gone out on strike. Railroads, light-
ing plants, smelters and other in-
dustries have been compelled to shut
down because of the strike, and
many large cities, including Zacate-
cas, Gomez Palacio, San Luis Potosi
and other places, are in darkness at
night because the electrical workers
and other employees are out on
strike. The workmen say they can-
not maintain their families on the
meagre wage given them.

TROOPS IN EGYPT
IN GOOD HEALTH
Precautions Taken by Medical
Corps Have Held Disease
in Check.

Headquarters of the British Army
in Egypt, Aug. 24.—The death rate
among British troops in Egypt from
all causes other than wounds received
in battle is very much less than
half the rate among the population
of London.
This result has been attained by
the British Army Medical Corps in
an army of great size distributed
over a vast area, where the water
supply must always be an urgent
problem, and often in neighborhoods
where the native population is per-
manently fighting a scourge of one
disease or another.
While the only disease the Medi-
cal Corps has not had to treat in the
hospitals are cholera and yellow
fever, the doctors have held all dis-
eases in check. Many desert camps,
which without strict observance of
all the rules might swiftly become
centres of deadly epidemics, have
clean bills of health.

Apple Crop is Poor.
The apple crop is reported to be
about only half a crop, with only
fifteen or twenty per cent. of it that
can be classed as first and second.

The apples are ill shaped, presum-
ably a result of the continued wet
weather during June.
