When about three miles from his cottage Mr. Robinson was taken ill, and was at once, hurried to "Fancy Free Cottage," the home of Mrs. E. Washburn, where Dr. Wilson, of Toronto, was a guest. Medical aid was given, but in a few minutes he passed away, death being due to acute indigestion.

Mr. Robinson was the only son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Robinson, and has spent the greater part of his life here, and in his passing Smith's Falls lost one of its valued citizens. He leaves to mourn his loss his wife, two sons, Stephen and Byron, also two sisters, Mrs. A. Maynes, Toronto, and Mrs. Ernest Kerfoot, Smith's Falls.

Dr. Robinson Receives Cheque For \$100 From Government.

Peterboro, Sept. 8.—Dr. F. L. LATE M. J. REID, BROCKVILLE
A Fenian Raid Veteran—Had a Very Active Life.

Brockville, Sept. 7.—M. J. Reid, a well-known resident, died yesterday aged seventy-six years. While still a young man he entered the hardware business with his brother, the late George Reid, and his younger brother, W. A. Reid. Later he was manager of the Revere House for four years. In 1882, at the time of the first real boom in Manitoba, he left here with a party under the direction of the late Major W. R. Bell for the purpose of founding the celebrated Bell farm at Indian Head. Returning from Manitoba he accepted a position in the freight department of the C.P.R. at Brockville wharf and held it for a period of 28 years. Some years ago he took up residence in California, but later came back to Brockville. For four years he was night clerk at the Central Hotel.

Deceased is survived by his wife, one son, Donald McK. Reid, and one daughter, Miss Mary Agnes (Mazie), and one brother, W. A. Reid, all of Brockville. The deceased was an Anglican in religion and a Conservative in politics. The deceased stood 6 ft. 3 inches. He was a Fenian Raid veteran and in 1869 succeeded the late Sheriff George A. Dana as quartermaster of the 42nd Battalion, under the late Lieut.-Col. J. D. Buehl.

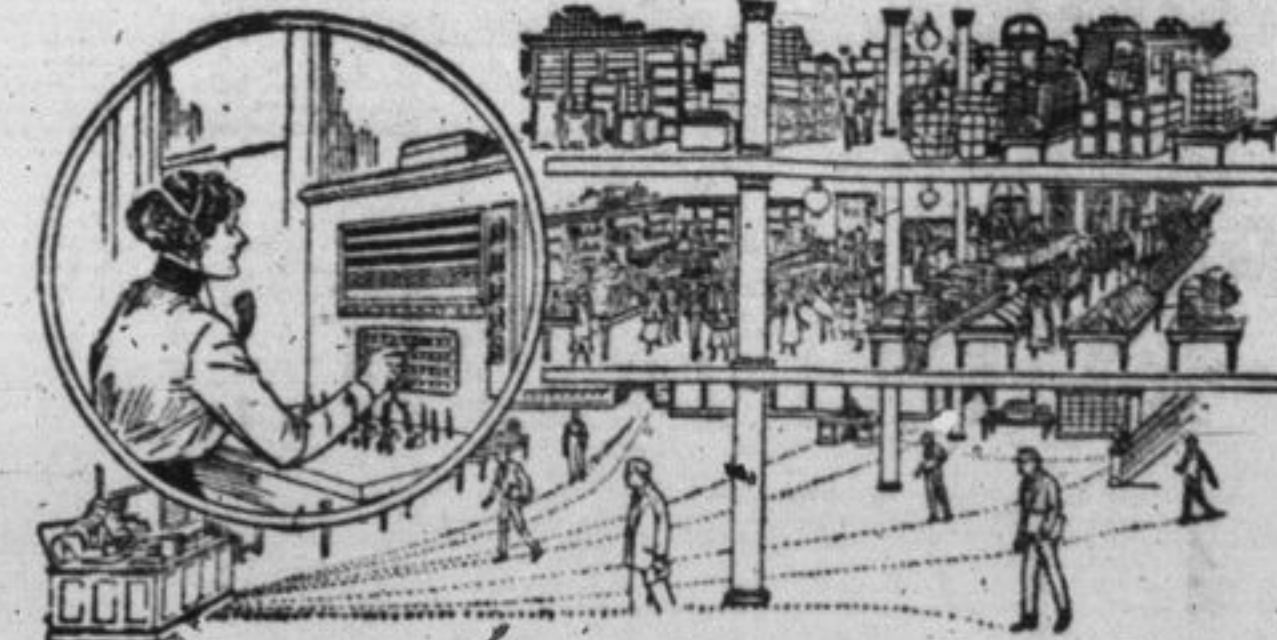
