The total allotment of bonds of this issue will be limited to one hundred million dollars exclusive of the amount (if any) paid for by the surrender of bonds as the equivalent of cash under the terms of the War Loan prospectus of 22nd November, 1915.

The instalments may be paid in full on the 16th day of October, 1916, or on any instalment due date thereafter, under discount at the rate of four per cent per annum. All payments are to be made to a chartered bank for the credit of the Minister of Finance. Failure to pay any instalment when due will render previous payments liable to forfeiture and the allotment to cancellation.

Subscriptions, accompanied by a deposit of ten per cent of the amount subscribed, must be forwarded through the medium of a chartered bank. Any branch in Canada of any chartered bank will receive subscriptions and issue provisional receipts.

This loan is authorized under Act of the Parliament of Canada, and both principal and interest will be a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Forms of application may be obtained from any branch in Canada of any chartered bank and at the office of any Assistant Receiver General in Canada.

Subscriptions must be for even hundreds of dollars.

In case of partial allotments the surplus deposit will be applied towards payment of the amount due on the October instalment.

Scrip certificates, non-negotiable or payable to bearer in accordance with the choice of the applicant for registered or bearer bonds, will be issued, after allotment, in exchange for the provisional receipts.

When the scrip certificates have been paid in full and payment endorsed thereon by the bank receiving the money, they may be exchanged for bonds, when prepared, with coupons attached, payable to bearer or registered as

Delivery of scrip certificates and of bonds will be made through the chartered banks.

The issue will be exempt from taxes—including any income tax—imposed in pursuance of legislation enacted by the Parliament of Canada.

The interest on the fully registered bonds will be paid by cheque, which will be remitted by post. Interest on bonds with coupons will be paid on surrender of coupons. Both cheques and coupons will be payable free of exchange at any branch in Canada of any chartered bank.

Recognized bond and stock brokers will be allowed a commission of one-quarter of one per cent on allotments made in respect of applications bearing their stamp, provided, however, that no commission will be allowed in respect of the amount of any allotment paid for by the surrender of bonds issued under the War Loan prospectus of 22nd November, 1915. No commission will be allowed in respect of applications on forms which have not been printed by the King's Printer.

### A VERY HAPPY RED CROSS EVENT

The Readings and Music Were of a High Type—The Crop Outlook.

Salem, Sept. 11.—The Salem Red Cross Society held a very successful ice-cream social on Thursday evening last, the total proceeds including the sale of tickets for a Red Cross quilt being \$95. The ladies were very fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Marion Wood Ayles, Bay City, Mich., spending her holidays with friends here, and George Weeks, Melville. The dry weather still continues, the light showers not having much effect in relieving the situation. Late potatoes are going to be as light a crop as the early ones. Buckwheat will only be average, and corn is

very poor, ensilage corn being only from two to three feet high. Farmers who had from 700 to 1,200 bushels of grain last year, this year have from 100 to 400 bushels. Those who are drawing hay to Trenton and Belleville cannot get more than \$14 per ton loose.

The inspector tested the milk at Hyland factory last week, the tests running from three per cent to 4.4 per cent, averaging 3.5 per cent. Some who have bred for quantity of milk regardless of fat will be hit quite hard, but the plan is a just one, only it is about ten years late in coming, as many farmers who a decade ago, laid the foundation for a herd producing large quantities of milk, will now have to breed along a different line, having regard for fat contents as well. But with the price of beef none will lose, as any animal which has to be sacrificed for beef will bring a good price.

Even a London evening paper, in commenting on the figures, notes the coincidence as certainly curious, but it is inevitable. Set down corresponding dates for King George or the Czar, or President Wilson, or the chairman of any county council, and

the result will be the same. Obviously the first and third lines (the date of birth and present age) must add up to 1,916, and so must the second and third lines (date of accession and number of years in office). "It would be 'certainly curious' if twice 1,916 did not make 3,832."
