MEDICAL BOARD EXAMINE AN INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION

EVERY MAN MUST UNDERGO A STRICT EXAMINATION

Capt. Hicks and Capt. MacGregor Are Now Engaged in Testing the Physical Fitness of the 156th Battalion Men.

Capt. Hicks and Capt. MacGregor of the Queen's Field Ambulance Corps, are now making an inspection of the men of the 156th Battalion to determine how many men in the Brockville unit must be rejected.

The lines of the artillery brigade are now in a neat and clean condition. The tent floors remain stacked in piles.

M. Ryan, Sharbot Lake, who went overseas with the 33rd Battery and was wounded at the front, is returning to the firing line after convalescing at Shorncliffe.
