# In the World of Sport

## BASEBALL BRIEFS.

The report that "Ping" Bodie, slugging outfielder of the San Francisco team will play in the majors next year seems to be all a mistake. It is said that poor old "Ping" is going to the Athletics.

When a manager fails to make good he says it is because the sporting scribes are running the team for him.

Another International League player who, it is rumored, will go up to the big show, is Second Baseman Gill, of the Buffalo team. Gill has been doing splendid work around the middle sack for the Bisons, and in addition is hitting the ball at a good clip.

Schack, of the White Sox, and Schanz, of the Athletics, who are recognized as the class of the American League backstops, will now have to share the spotlight with "Hank" Sauer. "Hank's" work behind the plate and his batting have been gleeful doings for the St. Louis Browns.

Ehmke, the pitching star of the Syracuse team, will join the Detroit Tigers at once, Pitcher Buckles, of Scranton, will also join the New York Yankees in the season in the New York State League having come to a close on Sunday.

Tommy McMillan, one of the best shortstops who ever played in the International League, has signed with Chattanooga, after being let out by Atlanta. McMillan will play for Rochester for a number of seasons.

The New York State League pennant was won by the Syracuse club. "Mike" O'Neill, a former St. Louis and Cincinnati player, managed the champions during the season. Under terms of agreement O'Neill becomes a free agent, O'Neill has already received an offer from the Binghamton club of the same league, while Syracuse also wants him again next season.

It would be rather remarkable if Honus Wagner should lead the National League in batting at 42 years of age, and yet that is what may happen.

First Baseman Holke, who was with Rochester right up to Labor Day, but who was recalled by the New York Giants at that time, is playing first base regularly for McGraw's team, and is coming in for much praise.

Fans in Toronto and Ontario generally will not be disappointed to see the Detroit Tigers win the American League flag and figure in the big annual baseball classic with the winners of the National League championship. Right now the Bengals appear to have a great chance to beat Boston for the pennant. Last season they finished a hard-up second after a great dash through the last few weeks of the campaign.

## NICK BAWLF WANTS BARRIEFIELD IN IT

**How Soldiers' Rugby League Is Likely to Be Worked Out.**

One plan for the proposed Soldiers' Rugby League is to have the Hamilton and Toronto teams play off, the winners to meet the survivors of an Ottawa-Montreal series. Nick Bawlf is also anxious to get his Ellingford soldiers in on the ground floor, so it looks as though the coming football season would see some good games after all.

The 207th team will likely be managed by Lieut. Jim McQuaig. His players will include Gordon Johnston, Dornie Adams, Joe McElligott and others of the Ottawa team of last year; also Lieut. Bud Wiser, a Prescott boy, who formerly played for Yale. It is understood that Sinc. McEvenue will coach the Montreal squad and that Lou Marsh is looking after arrangements in behalf of the Toronto team. A meeting of the football men will be held shortly for the purpose of drawing up a schedule or arranging dates for exhibition games.

**American Athletes Selected.**  
The American Athletic Association has definitely decided upon Robert Simpson of the University of Missouri, and Fred Murray of San Francisco, as the other members of the American team to accompany "Ted" Meredith and "Jo" Loomis abroad to compete in the games arranged in Christiansia, Norway, Copenhagen, Denmark and Stockholm, Sweden, on October, 12, 14 and 21 respectively.

It was originally intended to send a distance runner as the third member of the team, but the only man eligible for this place was Jole Ratz of Chicago, and it was impossible for him to make the trip.

**Carrigan to Say "Good-bye."**  
Bill Carrigan, manager of the world's champion Boston Red Sox, will play his last game of professional baseball October 4, unless he plays in another world's series immediately thereafter. In any event, this is his last season, he announced. Carrigan said he is tired of the game. He has saved money and is going into the grocery business at Lewiston, Me., his home town.

**Star Athlete Will Recover.**  
Matthew J. McGrath, a New York policeman, who holds the world's record for throwing the fifty-six pound weight, will recover from injuries received in a fall last night, physicians announce. McGrath was injured when he stepped off a low platform. At first it was thought his spine was affected.

## HAMILTON DOES NOT WANT

**Another Race Track—The Present One is Sufficient.**

The Hamilton Spectator says: The announcement from Montreal that eastern promoters figured on establishing another race track in Hamilton does not come as a surprise, although there is not much chance of the proposition ever coming to a head. Racing has been made unpopular around Montreal owing to so many tracks being in operation, and it looks as though the game will get a black eye in Ontario unless the government takes some step to limit the number of tracks. There is no need of giving any club a monopoly, but at the same time something must be done or the sport will die a natural death as it did in the majority of the states across the border. One track is about all that a city of this size can support at present, and if another one is necessary, there is a charter owned by local capitalists that can be operated without the assistance of American promoters who care nothing for the future of the game as long as their pockets are lined.

## HAD A CLOSE SHAVE.

**Montreal Wanderer Hockey Player on Quebec Bridge.**

William Bell, of Montreal, well known as Billy Bell of the Wanderer Hockey Club, and an engineer for the Dominion Bridge Company, had one of the narrow escapes and most thrilling experiences of the day in Montreal's disaster. He was in charge of a hydraulic jack at the north-east corner of the bridge when he suddenly felt a tremor, apparently proceeding from the north-west. Then there was a slipping and suddenly the whole span sheered and fell. Mr. Bell was standing quite close to Mr. McMillan and when some of the wire ropes snapped as the span fell a broken piece flew back and hit Mr. McMillan and broke his hip. It missed Bell's head by barely a foot.

## ATHLETE SERGEANT-MAJOR

**Qualified For Commission at Royal Military College.**

The efficiency of a battalion depends to a large extent upon its sergeant-major. Kitchener's Own, of Montreal, commanded by Lieut. Col. F. M. McRobie, should therefore prove a highly efficient unit, for the O.C. has secured the services of Battalion Sergt.-Major Arthur Edwin Hill, international water polo player and footballer and all-round athlete. He has had both Imperial and Canadian military experience. He served for four years in the Royal Warwickshires in Birmingham, and since being in Canada has been with the 207th Battalion at Ottawa, leaving there to come here to Kitchener's Own. Sergt.-Major Hill joined the 207th as a private and four days later was promoted to sergeant. Then in May he went to the Royal Military College at Kingston and qualified as a lieutenant; but there being no immediate vacancy, he returned to his old battalion and obtained the rank of company sergeant-major, being in that position when he obtained his transfer to Kitchener's Own.
