MINISTERS ARE IN KHAKI

THREE SOLDIERS AT BARRIE FIELD QUALIFIED MINISTERS.

Sergeant in 156th is M.A. and Ph.D.—Two Others Have Also Been in Clerical Garb.

There are ministers at the camp as privates, sergeants and officers, and to prove the statement the Whig learned on Friday morning of three cases of qualified ministers being in the ranks.

Sgt. McAlpin, of the 156th Battalion, is senior, according to military rank, and should therefore come first. One day there was a tall ministerial looking young man who walked into the recruiting office of the 156th Battalion in Brockville and announced his intention of enlisting. He is a Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy, and inquiry showed Lieut.-Col. Bedell that the man was clever enough to take a commission officer's rank if given a chance to qualify. He was offered the opportunity, but refused on the ground that being in the ranks better enabled him to do good work among the men. He is not only a good N.C.O., but a soldier of great moral value to the 156th, and has already done much for the moral welfare of the battalion men.

Pte. J. and Pte. Mair; two late recruits in the Queen's Rifle and Police Corps, are both qualified ministers of the Gospel. Pte. Gordon, left his Baptist charge near Bowmanville and went to Yale, where he took a post graduate course. He enlisted in the Queen's unit on his return to Canada.

Pte. Mair is an athlete and a Methodist minister, having been serving his God and country in that capacity at Melrose before donning the khaki to serve in a slightly different way.

METHODISTS ARE TO HOLD

MISSIONARY SERVICES ON THREE SUNDAYS IN OCTOBER.

Laymen's Missionary Banquets to be Arranged in District Places—Resolution Passed Regarding Abolition of Sale of Liquor.

The Methodist district finance board met again on Friday afternoon. These appropriations for the various mission fields were recommended: \$322 granted to Stella; \$132 to Wolfe Island; \$429 to Parham; and \$300 to Perth Road.

Pleasure was expressed that the missionary expenditure for the past year was \$250 less than the preceding year, and that as good work had been accomplished.

The committee appointed in the forenoon to arrange the details for a missionary campaign in October reported as follows:—That on Sunday, October 15th, a general pulpit exchange among the ministers of the district be held; that on Sunday, October 22nd, the pastors preach missionary sermons to their own congregations, and that on Sunday, October 29th, prominent laymen of the district present appeals to the congregations.

It was also decided that laymen's missionary banquets be held as far as possible in the district during the season.

Rev. G. S. Clendinning reported that the date for the convention of the young people of the district for the reorganization of the district Epworth Leagues and that the convention would be held in this city.

Rev. J. D. Ellis, Rev. Alfred Brown, Rev. C. W. Hollingsworth, and Elmer Davis and J. A. Jackson were appointed as the district missionary committee.

Rev. Mr. Pierce, pastor of the Depot church, reported on the work being done in his district, and was assured by the meeting that they were in sympathy with his earnest efforts.

The following resolution, moved by Elmer Davis and seconded by the Rev. G. S. Clendinning, received the unanimous approval of the meeting: "Whereas the legislature of the Province of Ontario has in response to a very large signed petition passed an act abolishing the public sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes to become effective, Saturday, September 16th; therefore, be it resolved that we place on record our deep and humble gratitude to Almighty God for His goodness in removing this evil from our midst; that we record our appreciation of the act of the legislature in passing the act above referred to; that we as men of this district meeting pledge our assistance in all possible ways in the enforcement of this act and in the necessary preparation for the vote of June 1919."

This resolution was passed by the singing of the doxology, followed by some discussions as to the effect of the act and its enforcement.

It was decided that educational and social services should be held on all circuits. It was also decided that the next meeting would be held in November.

A REAL SOLDIER HAS GONE

DEATH OF MAJOR McLAUGHLIN REGRETTED AT THE CAMP.

Popular Officer, Who Was at Camp With 8th C.M.R., Was Well Known and Popular With All Ranks.

Before joining the 8th C.M.R. for overseas service, Major McLaughlin was a barrister at Bowmanville, having had extensive previous military experience with the 3rd Prince of Wales Regiment.
