He Was a Son of Charles Maund, 90 Frontenac Street.

Charles Maund, 90 Frontenac street, received word on Thursday that his son, Lieut. Frederick C. Maund, had been killed in action. Lieut. Maund was well known in the city, having been engaged in the K. & P. office for a number of years, where he was regarded as a most efficient and painstaking clerk. He was in the Temiskaming district when the war broke out, and soon after enlisted with a battalion formed in Halleybury.

Lieut. Maund was in England for nearly a year, and about two months ago was sent to France. The deceased young officer was twenty-seven years of age.

#### PTE. G. W. MARTIN DESERTED FROM THE 156th BATTALION.

"You Are a Coward and I Do Not Think There is an Ounce of Sand in You," Said Justice of the Peace Hunter in Passing Sentence.

"You are a coward, and I do not think there is an ounce of sand in you," said Justice of the Peace George Hunter on Friday morning, as he sentenced Pte. G. W. Martin, of Millbrook, a member of the 156th Battalion, to one year in the Central Prison, on a charge of desertion.

Martin claimed that he deserted because he had been ill-treated by officers of his battalion, but this charge was not substantiated. On the other hand, it was proven that Martin had received every attention on the part of the officers. The accused pleaded hard for another chance to don the khaki, but the Court would not listen to his plea, as his conduct, while wearing the uniform, had not been very good.

The prisoner stated that he had a wife and one child, and it was on this account he asked for a light sentence. He also had his father and mother to care for. He was told that his parents, wife and child would be well looked after while he was serving his time; in fact they would be better looked after than if he were undertaking the task.

In passing sentence, Justice of the Peace Hunter made some pointed remarks. He drew attention to the lack of men at the front, and told Martin that men of his stamp were doing the country harm in dropping out of the lines, just when there was such a great need for men.

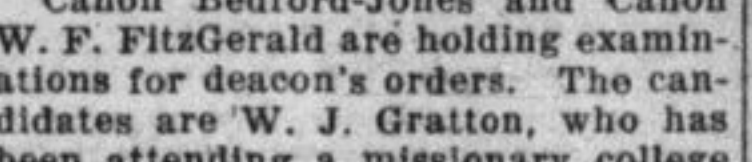
