GERMANY MUST LOSE

PARALLELS TAKEN FROM THE NAPOLEONIC WARS.

Every Conflict in Which Britain Has Been Involved Has Had Its Dark Days When Everybody Was Hopeless of Victory—Wellington Insisted on Persevering When the People Were Anxious to Give Up.

THE future is full of hope," said a great Frenchman recently, and as he could not, for military reasons, give chapter and verse for his belief, we had to content to take his word for it. But if the future is full of hope, so, too, is the past, and what is more, anyone who cares to turn to the pages of history can learn the fullest details without fear of intervention from the censor. Many of us are apt to believe that the Boer War was the only one which had its dark days, but that is only because most of us remember them. Yet the campaign in which we look back with the greatest pride, that which finally ended with the Battle of Waterloo, had darker days than any we have known in this war. Wellington and Nelson carried us finally to victory, but they did it almost in spite of ourselves, for we had the "regrettable incidents" of this war had counterparts a hundred years ago. The defeat of Napoleon was not, as we are too inclined to think, the result of a series of brilliant campaigns, ending in the triumph of Waterloo, Pitt said, "We have saved ourselves by our exertions, and shall save Europe by our example." It was not an example of efficiency; it was an example of bulldog tenacity. For six years we hung on to Napoleon in Spain and Portugal, while he overran the rest of Europe. We had defeats as well as victories, twice our armies were within an ace of being driven into the sea; still we hung on, and finally the rest of Europe, seeing that Napoleon was not invincible, came back to the task of crushing him.

Our great man—the Duke of Wellington—insisted that we should persevere when the people, and even the Government of the day, were inclined to give up. Those who thought the task hopeless had been discouraged by one failure after another. They could point to the Dardanelles expedition more disastrous than ours. In February, 1807, a squadron of ships under Admiral Duckworth was dispatched with orders to force the Dardanelles, appear before Constantinople, and demand the surrender of the Turkish fleet. The Turkish fleet was within an ace of being driven into the sea; still we hung on, and finally the rest of Europe, seeing that Napoleon was not invincible, came back to the task of crushing him.

A hundred years ago our navy was supreme as it is now. The Battle of Trafalgar fought in 1805, Napoleon was hardly at the height of his power, shattered the French navy for good. But Napoleon, like our arch-enemy to-day, hoped to destroy England's sea power by other means. His plan, however, did not involve the wholesale slaughter of non-combatants. He was then master of practically all the sea coast of Europe, except Spain and Portugal, and was looked on as an all-victorious leader. In 1806, by the famous Decrees of Berlin, he declared the British Isles to be in a state of blockade. He had no U boats to enforce his will, but his decrees made it a crime to have any intercourse with Great Britain. All British subjects found in any country in alliance with France were to be made prisoners, and every article of British produce or manufacture was to be confiscated. To enforce this plan, which Napoleon called the "Continental System," all the sea coasts were to be carefully patrolled by Customs officers. But the decrees told heavily on his own people, and especially on his allies. Britain was then the only great manufacturing country in the world, and they had been in the habit of getting from her a thousand and one necessary commodities. They would not give them up readily, and systematic smuggling began.

Articles were especially imported from Britain into Spain and Portugal, and smuggled thence across the French frontier. Napoleon saw that Spain and Portugal must come under his domination before the "blockade" was effective, and he began the Peninsular War. But Portugal was our old ally. Britain landed troops there, and on the war which ended in Napoleon's defeat. Napoleon was defeated because he had the whole of Europe against him. The sea power and money power of Britain, and the vast population of the Russian Empire, were more than he could stand against when once his own people felt the strain of the continual wastage of men.

It was only when the Allies had gained a footing in France that the discontent became manifest. When once that had happened, it spread so rapidly that Napoleon himself saw that all hope of further resistance was gone. The final stages of the war occupied only a few weeks, a fact which is also of good augury for our own future. Bread prices were raised from five cents a loaf to six cents by one of the largest bakers firms in Chicago. The advance was made necessary, it was declared, by the higher cost of materials.
