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SCHEME TO RAISE MONEY

FOR THE PATRIOTIC FUND SOON TO BE DISCUSSED.

Meeting of Committee on Friday Afternoon—Co-operation Asked in Providing Work For Returned Soldiers.

There was a meeting of the Patriotic Fund Committee in the Board of Trade Rooms on Friday afternoon. The mayor presided. The secretary submitted a report showing the movements in connection with the fund during June, July and August. This statement showed that there had been added 122 women and 154 children, with a financial liability of \$1,592.90. There had been removed from the fund during the same three months 57 women and 83 children, with a financial liability of \$176.50. As between the additions and the removals there is a net increase of 65 women and 74 children, calling for a monthly allowance of \$816.40.

The city, out of the amount which was subscribed by the people voluntarily on the outbreak of the war, the amount which the council voted, has contributed to the Patriotic Fund at Ottawa, to date, \$84,000; and the fund has disbursed on account of the families who are living here, \$109,461.51.

In 1914 the citizens promised \$52,176. They have paid, of this sum, to date, \$49,013. Of the balance \$1,700 is regarded as good, and \$1,463 as doubtful.

There are about 400 families dependent upon the Patriotic Fund for some of the money which is necessary for their maintenance, and the monthly contributions have risen \$5,581.40 in April, to \$7,229.60 in September.

The council has, since the beginning of the year, paid out of the special tax, which it has been authorized to collect, \$5,000 a month. At the end of the year the amount thus paid over will be \$60,000, and before the last payment is made a new scheme of raising funds for 1917 must be discussed. Some of the

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beneficiaries in Canada, like some of the beneficiaries in the Old Land, are acting frivolously, and in a manner to discourage generous givings. But a large number are most deserving. Their gratitude is deep and abiding.

The delegate from the Patriotic Fund in Kingston to the conference which was held in Toronto some time ago, Mr. Nickle, reported, calling special attention to certain points which were discussed at this conference. These points are elaborated in the printed minutes of the council, and they are well worth perusal.

Correspondence was received from the secretary of the National Service Commission, which has for its object the uniting of the labors of all the societies or organizations which are engaged in national service. This is a comprehensive matter, and was left over for the consideration of a larger meeting, which will be attended by members of the council and Board of Trade, and the Patriotic Fund.

A matter of greater urgency was the appeal of the Soldiers' Aid Commission for co-operation in providing work for returned soldiers, and work which would be suitable for them in their new conditions. This matter will receive further consideration at a later date.

Two More R. M. C. Men Dead. In the list of officers who have died is Sec.-Lieut. E. H. McCall, a Kingston Royal Military College graduate, who was gazetted to the Royal Horse Artillery in August, 1915.

Capt. August W. Arnew, of Victoria, B. C., who is reported as having died of wounds, was a graduate of the Royal Military College and formerly of Montreal.

Bowling Games. Two double bowling games were played on Queen's green on Friday evening. J. F. McMillan and F. Kinser won from J. M. Elliott and W. J. Burns by 29 to 8, and W. G. Crozier and J. W. Power won from W. G. Ferguson and J. I. McCrae by 15 to 12.
